MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.
THREE INTERESTING SESSIONS AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

Two eloquent addresses given by Rev. A. P. McDiarmid and Rev. H. F. Laflamme, of the Baptist Board of Foreign Missions.

A missionary conference was opened in the Baptist church on Tuesday of last week. Rev. A. P. McDiarmid, M.A., secretary of the Baptist board of foreign missions, and Rev. H. F. Laflamme, missionary to the Tagalogas in India, were present. The subject of "Man's Salvation," and our fellowship with the world, was the leading idea at the afternoon service. Mr. Laflamme was the first speaker, and discussed impressively upon God's thought concerning man.

"What is God's Thought? Can man by searching find out God?" He can be known, not by the searching of reason, but only in His own revelation. God has written two books—John I interprets Gen. I. The Creation and the Word, the revealers of God. To know God's thought about man's condition, we must know the Lord Jesus Christ.

Those who seek to attain to God by endeavoring to imitate Jesus Christ will fail. Christ is not simply, nor chiefly, an example. Christ the crucified, not Christ the glorified, is the Christ of the scripture. Consider His suffering and death. Does not this mean that we are to follow Him as an example to death, or does it mean that He bore our sins in His death that we might have life? Calvary means that man is lost. No doctrine of instant hope, or no sympathy for the heathen, will obscure the truth that man is lost. They know God as God. The invisible things of Him, from the creation, are clearly discerned by the things that are made, that they may be without excuse. How, then, can God be just and condemn the multitude of lost? Many instances were then given of expert men in heathen lands in which the heathen recognized themselves as guilty and trembled before God. In connection with the speaker read Rom., culminating in the thought, "except they believe how can they be saved?"

The ground of their condemnation is not our failure to give them the gospel. They are condemned already. The question is whether we will give them the gospel. Mr. McDiarmid next spoke as follows:—The questions of man's condition and salvation are the most momentous questions before us. It is, therefore, important that we have correct thoughts concerning them. What we need, then, is to get God's thoughts on these subjects. Kipler said, when he traced the movements of heavenly bodies, "I am tracing God's thought." No science is true unless it be a true interpretation of God's thought. God could not withhold His son from the salvation of the world; "What is a man profited if he gain the whole world and lose his soul? Look at the context and see the supreme importance of the son; Christ had just revealed an idea going to Calvary to save men." Peter, thinking man's thoughts, contradicted Him and revealed his failure of thought. His failure was that he did not see a supreme need to accomplish it. What is God's thought of what salvation is? I am afraid our thoughts are indeed, an escape from a place called hell and entrance to a place called heaven? That idea may be contained, but is not the idea. God's thought of salvation is that it is our escape from sin—not its consequences, but the ruin of our lives—ridding it of the diseases and troubles that make life a burden to you.
