THE OPPOSITION HOUSE. Maiden Speeches of Messrs. Pattullo and Auld.

ABLE EFFORTS OF THE NEW MEN. The Opposition Leader Starts Out by Seeking Information—Premier Hardy Supplies It—Mr. Haycock Also Gets in His Say—Harmonious Day on the Whole.

Toronto, Feb. 12.
