As Compared With the Previous Year-Cuts Made in Regard to Agriculture and Hospitals and Charities-A Host of Petitions-Questiens and Answers.

Toronto, Feb. 18. The estimates for the year were laid upon the table by the Provincial Treasurer yesterday. The total amount which the House is asked to provide on account of current expenditure is \$3,250,341, on capital acount \$229,222 and for other purposes \$36,504, making a total of \$3,516,068, or \$190,000 less than the actual expenditure for last wear, as shown by the public accounts brought down on the previous day. Maintenance of public institutions continues to be the largest account. closely followed by education with \$717,927. Under the last named heading an increase from \$8000 to \$15,000 for Public school leaving and continuation classes apparently represents the extent of aid which the Government intends to grant toward the establishment of continuation classes. The total increase in the amount asked for educational purposes is \$13,000. For maintenance of public institutions, an increase of \$7000 is asked, of which \$5000 is for the Mimico Asylum. An increase of \$1800 for maps and printing is shown in immigration account. The agricultural

source of revenue aside from the subsidy, the amount being \$129,000 in exces of the estimate, a satisfactory result in view of the unfavorable year for the lumber industry. Year by year the aggregate revenue from liquor licenses is declining, and will contirue to decline, of course, owing to the steady diminution in the number of licenses issued. Of the revenue received from this source last year \$112,came from the city municipalities and \$155,551 from other municipalities. The various municipalities received \$267,072 as their share of the feees. In addition to this amount \$18,250 was received from 65 brewers and 8 distillers. Litigation which has been decided by the judgment of the Privy Council on 6th February declares that a license fee imposed upon a person carrying on the trade of brewer and wholesale vendor of ale is not indirect taxation; that it is ultra vires provincial legislation. and it affirms our powers to impose a direct tax upon a bank or other commercial corporation carrying on business within the province. Local option bylaws are in force in

From Haldimand, Halton, Norfolk, Peterborough, Prince Edward and Prescott and Russell no revenue was derived during the year. The proportion of estates upon which duty was paid was one in eighty-six. We expended a little less than the educational vote of last year. The over expenditures were for departmental examinations and superannuated teachers. The cost of examinations increases as the number of candidates increase. The fees paid by candidates amounted to \$34,661.

The expenditure for the maintenance of our public institutions represents an amount equal to about one-fourth of the total annual revenue, and was \$40,000 greater than in 1893. The overexpenditure on the Brockville Asylum is accounted for by the fact that the number of inmates is small and the cost per capita greater than in larger institutions. The cost per capita of maintenance of patients in the asylums was \$134.55, as compared with \$142.65 in 1895, \$127.22 in 1894 and \$135.71 in 1893.

The expenditure for hospitals and charities was the largest the Province has yet incurred. The grants amounted to \$194,615. Up to the present time assistance had been given to fourteen counties for County Houses of Refuge, amounting to \$53,750. In concluding my remarks on the annual expenditures I wish especially to call attention to the fact that we are year by year reducing our expenses, a reduction of \$455,000 having been made in five years. MR. MATHESON'S CRITICISM.

Lieut.-Col. Matheson, upon ing, after recess to criticize the budget address, began by congratulating Mr. Harcourt on his concluding allusions to the wonderful resources of the province. Such a thing should always be done in a budget speech, but he was also obliged to condole with the Treasurer upon the deplorable state of affairs he was forced to defend. The expenditures were above the receipts constantly, and, while the former were increasing year by year, the revenue stood at a standstill. Year by year they had to face the same old story of unaltered receipts in the different departments. It could not be expected, therefore, that the criticism of the conduct of the financial affairs should vary to any great degree. There had always existed a great temptation on the part of Ministers to magnify their own importance by increasing expenditure by means of extended patronage, etc., in their several departments. It should be the duty of a strong Premier to hold such colleagues in check The late Premier, Sir O. Mowat, while he deserved credit in many ways, had proper conception of the financial condition of the province. Turning his attention to the demoli-

tion of the timber limits, the Opposition financier claimed that at the present rate of cutting the supply would be exhausted in four or five years. The timber limits were now paying scarcely anything. Commenting upon the item

ceipts and expenditure from students fees, he claimed that the Education which the Minister of Education was the soul, frame and centre. It was not right that the Government should control all education from the commonschool up to the University. lations to the Attorney-General, Provincial Secretary, Mr. Speaker and Mr. Whitney. He justified the expenditures of the Government as being judicious, in the best interests of the Province, and challenged the hon, gentlemen opposite to show where one single dollar of the public money had been misappropriated or had been applied for any other purpose than that for which it had been authorized. Would the Opposition object to the expenditure upon the educational institutions, the institutions for the deaf, the blind, the institutions for the care of those unfortunates who are mentally afflicted? Where would they apply the pruning knife? He regretted that the Provincial Treasurer has seen fit to reduce the estimates for colonization roads, and hoped that the hon. gentleman would take the matter into his consideration and restore the grant to the same amount as last year. The hardy settlers had, he thought, enough difficulties to contend against without the addition of poor roads. In reference to the surplus, he did not care whether there was a million dollars of deficit (he would of course rather have a balance at the bank), so long as the Province obtained full value for the money. As proof of the economical administration of the Government he quoted from statistics to show that the City of Toronto expended annually a sum equal to that required for the whole Province.
