THIRTEEN YEARS OF PROGRESS

How Our North Country is Filling up

and Developing. The following from the Burke's Falls Arrow, in connection with the recent transfer of schools from the Muskoka to the Haliburton inspectorate, will give our readers some idea of the rapid rate at which the vast extent of territory north and north-west of us is filling up: At the time of Inspector Grant's appointment, thirteen years ago the Northern and Pacific Junction Railway from Gravenhurst to North Bay was under construction. There were no incorporated villages. Now we have three railways, two incorporated villages and five towns. At that time there were in Mr. Grant's inspeciorate only 65 schools; which up to the time of the division, increased to 205 including one Model school and three District Teachers' Training Institutes. These figures speak for themselves. In the rapid transition from the primaval forest to the large acreage of cultivated lands, from the rude log huts to the palatial residences, private and public buildings, our schools have kept pace. Thirteen years ago there were few regularly qualified teachers and the instruction of our children was largely in the hands of teachers whose only qualification was a permit. Heat from El-ctric Lamps

So firm is the idea that the incandescent electric lamp is free from heat that it is frequently found to be burial. (This is a mistake, and care should be exercised with the electric good of the greater number in my es- lamp in its application in this connection. But of course the risk is not so great as when naked lights are employed. It has been found by experiment that on immersing a sixteen candle power lamp, 100 volts pressure, in half a pint of water, the water boils within half an hour, and in proport onately less time when a thirty-two candle power lamp is substituted. If again the lamp is buried in cotton woo, the wool soon begins to scorch and ultimately burst into flame. In one experiment which was tried, this bursting into flame was accompanied by a loud report, due to the explosion of the lamp. It clearly appears from this that the incandescent electric lamp cannot be regarded as a means unlikely of starting a serious fire, and shopkeepers, especially those who exhibit highly inflammable fabrics, should know that there is a risk in placing such goods too close to a lamp.




