The Holmes Case. In compliance with the advice of the township solicitor a compromise was effected with Mr. Holmes and an agreement made with Mr. John Bryans owner of a 1/2 lot 11, con. 7, averting danger of further litigation about said water-course. Mr. Calvert then moved, seconded by Mr. Byrne, that a com-pensation \$30 be paid Mr. Jos Holmes as payment in full for his alleged claim of \$60 against this council, and that \$6.50 be allowed him for legal expenses incurred.-Carried.

That Statute Labor. On motion of Messrs. Currins and Byrne, Pathmaster Milligan and Philip Meagher were heard in reference to the disputed statute labor. Mr. Meagher said he thought his work for 1898 had been done until he got his tax bill. His son who did the work, was not aware of one day being returned against him, but since the pathmaster declares he did his duty he (Meagher) would pay the dollar rather than have any further trouble about it. Mr. Reeds, who had said that half a day's work had been wrongfully returned against him, entered the council room soon after the pathmaster had left, expecting to get his fifty refunded, but no! the pathmaster had not awarded it, and Mr. Reeds retired with the apparent intention of spending about ten dollars to get his fifty cents

Mr. Jas. Kennedy, owner lot 7, con. 7 on being asked his business said he had come to ask the council to grant, say\$25 to make the 6th con. line west of his place passable as a winter road, that he would do the work for the sum, that \$4.50 had been received for timber taken off the roadway, but was not expended on it as promised. That Mr. Byrne when in council before refused to let ten dollars on it. Mr. Byrne gave his reason for doing so and quite an altercation took place between him and Mr. Kennedy. The reeve said that when the appropriations would be made he would endeavor to visit such roadways as the one in question to have an understanding with the commissioner regarding them. Mr. Kennedy then handed in an account of \$4 for shoveling snow on beats No: 30 and 31, but as the account was not certified by the pathmasters the council could not entertain it, and Mr. Kennedy was again disappointed.

To Save Time. The waste of time thus caused prompted the following resolution:-Moved by Mr. Byrne, seconded by Mr. Calvert, that ratepayers desiring the attention of the council in session, present their business in writing so as to prevent unnecessary delay or loss of time during council meetings .-

Carried. Crushed Stone.

Messrs. J. Murtha, J. Graham, H. Patten, J. Patten and Chas. Hartley, next addressed the council asking that about 60 cords of stone be crushed and put on Downeyville road this year since there is no gravel available for said road. Mr. Currins said he could not afford to put more than half that quantity on without the appropriations were increased which meant an increase in the taxes.
