No doubt the joy would be more hilarious if they had brought back more prizes, but after all, the great thing was to have them tack sale and sound (Applause). It was true they had been unfortunate-for 16 days the mercury had never been higher than 20 below zero, and had gone below 40; they had also been unlucky in having to play on very poor skating ice - the severe cold rendered it impossible to make good ice. Had he and his men been in perfect condition they might have done better; skips sometimes get credit where they should not, but this time he could say he had been at fault. On the night of the fire he had contracted a severe cold, and that may have had something to do with their poor success. Many of the best rinks were defeated, and on the whole the record of the Lindsay rink was as good as any rink at the bonspiel, but it so happened they every loss meant for them a "bowl-out." He felt that a rink could be selected in Lindsay that could defeat any in the west. (Cheers). Mr. Kennedy, after alluding to the
