

A Steamship Struck by Lightning. London, Feb. 16.-A despatch from

Senegal bay states that the British steamer Congo," Captain Murray, from Hamburg, December 8, via Antwerp, for the Congo States, has arrived there in a fearfully battered condition. On the passage out she met a hurricane accompanied with thunder and lightning off Lisbon, and for a time her position was most critical. Every body aboard, officers, crew and passengers believed the vessel would go down. The steamer labored fearfully in the tremendous sea, and it appeared as though she would puil her bolts out. Orders were given to abandon the ship.

The boats were provisioned, and they were just upon the point of being launched when lightning a ruck the steamer. This drave nearly all hands below, and before they dared to venture on deck again the lightning had struck four times. The plates, however, acted as excellent conductors and the electric currents were carried into the water without doing any damage that endangered the ship. Some of the persons who remained on deck during this most dangerous period were stunned by the shocks and several were mcre our less injured. In the meantime the vessel appears to have got into the outer edge of the storm and it was decided to stand by her. This was done and she
