The complimentary banquet tendered by the Lindsay curling club and citizens on Friday evening last to the victorious Winnipeg rink was "recherche" in all its details, and was only equalled by that given Skip Flavell and his party a year ago when they returned similarly laden with spoils of conquest in the form of massive silver tankards. The banquet was given at the Simpson house, the large dining-room of which had been handsomely adorned for the occasion with streamers, banners and curling, hockey and snowshoe emblems. At 8:30 about seventy of the leading citizens of the town sat down to the well-appointed tables and proceeded to do justice to the appetizing viands provided, music being supplied meanwhile by Messrs. Denison and Humphreys, whose violin and organ selections were greatly enjoyed. After half an hour had been devoted to satisfying the needs of the "inner man" the intellectual portion of the evening's program was introduced by Mayor Ray, who occupied the chair, having on his right and left Messrs. J. D. Flavell, J. A. McMillan, J. McLennan and W. H. Simpson, who comprised the victorious rink.

COMMERCIAL NEWS. OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, MARCH 3, 1892. Toronto Live Stock Market. Business at the western cattle market opened Tuesday morning with 12 loads on offer, of which four loads were held over from yesterday. The total receipts last week were 1,131 cattle, 583 sheep and lambs, and 435 hogs. Trade all round ruled pretty much as on Friday last, with perhaps a trifle duller feeling in cattle on account of the poor quality of the larger part of the offerings. About five or six loads went through to Montreal, some of the first being Total receipts last week were 1,131 cattle, 583 sheep and lambs, and 435 hogs. Cattle—There was a good demand and brisk trade for all the good cattle on the market, but when these were bought up sales were dragsy and low prices were the order of the day. The quality, as above remarked, was poorer, if any, than that of the last market day, and holders wanted higher figures than buyers felt disposed to give, or in fact than the stock was worth. Some fancy picked butchers' cattle sold at 4 and 4 1/2, but sales of this kind were few. There was a fair attendance of butchers on the market for suitable stock for the trade, but the demand was not so great as on Friday. In some cases good fat but not too heavy, bulls, of which there was a fair supply on offer, were substituted. Prices were not notably changed from last week. Inferior and rough cows and oxen sold at 2 1/2 to 3; fair, 3 1/2 to 4; and heavy, 4 to 5. Total receipts last week were 1,131 cattle, 583 sheep and lambs, and 435 hogs. 21 mixed, averaging 1,100, at \$3.25 per cwt; 14 steers, " 1,200, " 4.00 " 16 mixed, " 1,000, " 3.75 " 10 " " 1,150, " 3.50 per cwt; 21 mixed, " 800, " 35.50 per head; 10 " " 1,075, " 42.00 " Choice. Milch cows and springers—There were about 25 on offer Tuesday, of the quality of last week's offering was noticeable. There was a poor enquiry but Tuesday for export, 19 cows were sold. Prices ranged higher, and we quote \$33 to \$40 per head, being bought for Montreal. Prices for the milch cows but they did not attract much attention. Three fair animals sold for \$120, butchers' trade. Stockers and bulls—The demand for good stockers weighing in the neighborhood of 1,000 lbs. and upwards was good, and a few were obtained for such. Tuesday there were not many good animals offered and prices ruled as high as \$1.50 to \$1.80 per lb. for the outside figure will be paid for the right kind.
