This does not need a lawyer to construe have filters only, but the best modern appliances, and no person can tell with the advance of science what better appliances they may have in a few years. If the Scugog river water cannot be made good why does not the provincial board of health or Dr. Herriman say so and be done with it, but they will not venture opinion, but on the contrary the provincial board of health suggest the contract in its present form, or with alterations, be affirmed, and suggest the kind of filterers to be used, and the company are quite ready to change the contract and agree to put in the filters of the P. B. H. But I do not think there present form, providing for the best modern appliances from time to time, is much stronger and better in the interest of the town. If the filters suggested by the P.B.
