


PETERBORO. DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.-At an early hour Monday morning a fire broke out in the carbon department of the Brooks Manufacturing Co.'s works. There are two watchmen on the premises but the fire burned rapidly. An alarm was sent in and the fire department was on hand promptly, but the carbon department was then enveloped in fismes and was burned. The fiames, however, were confined to that portion o the works. There was heavy and expensive machinery used in the manufacture of carbone, which was damaged. The loss is estimated at about \$8,000, and is covered by insurance. It was fortunate that the whole place was not burned, and by rushing the repairs the company expects to have the works going again with little de-


