The Names and the Medals.

The director of the mint is having a terrible time trying to reduce the names of foreign exhibitors at the exposition to the dimensions of the medals granted by the bureau of awards. There is a little tablet on the medals which will contain at the utmost only 32 letters, and some of the foreign names contain 150 or 200 letters, which he does not know how to abbreviate. There is a Russian exhibitor, for example, whose four names contained more than 100 letters, and only one of them can be placed strength. "As the cherry flower is first upon the medal. It is a very embarrassing and ticklish duty to make a selection, particularly when one is not familiar with the Russian language. The Germans, the Austrians, the Hungarians and the Bohemians are quite as bad, and as the list reads now less than half the foreign names can be properly inscribed.
