We place before our readers in a supplement to THE POST the budget speech or annual exposition of Ontario's finances by the provincial treasurer, Hon. Richard Harcourt.

THE WILSON TARIFF BILL. The Wilson tariff bill, as amended by the Senate finance committee, has, after what seems a very long delay, been reported, and the debate in the senate is open on Monday, 2nd April.

The Toronto Globe says:—"Figures are sometimes made eloquent, but they are seldom made humorous, as in Mr. Hardy's review of Mr. A. F. Wood's estimated savings to be effected by the abolition of the fee system. As to the expense, the member for North Hastings named eight registry districts, in which the average yearly net receipts for five years were \$5,842. Mr. Hardy found on investigation that the highest yearly average was \$2,811.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr. R. W. Phipps, the well known clerk of forestry under the Mowat government, passed away in Toronto last week. He was one of the city's pioneer residents.

The Dominion estimates were laid before the house Tuesday. A decrease of \$4,485,521 is promised as compared with last year's expenditure. A reduction is badly needed, but it is extremely unlikely that this brilliant forecast will be borne out at the end of the year.

The Australasian colonies, with Canada, are bringing pressure to bear upon the British government to grant subsidies with proposed Atlantic and Pacific fast steam ship services, and the Pacific cable. It is proposed that Canada and Australia shall contribute one-third each, and the home government the remainder.

Sir Oliver Mowat's opinion upon a constitutional question has again been upheld against that of the federal premier. The supreme court has declared that the provincial executive possesses power to pardon persons convicted of violating provincial statutes, as contended by Mr. Mowat. The constitutionality of the act was disputed by the Dominion authorities.

The Nova Scotia elections on Thursday of last week resulting in a crushing tory defeat. Cahan leader of the opposition and his trusty lieutenant, Webster, being among the slain. Sir John Thompson and several of his henchmen tried to cajole the "blue-noses," but their eloquence and stock arguments fell flat, as evidenced by the liberal sweep of 27 out of 38 seats.

Louis Kosuth, the renowned Hungarian patriot, died Tuesday last in exile at Turin, Italy. He was born April 21st, 1828, of noble parentage, and in 1832 was a prominent member of the Hungarian house of representatives. His struggle against Austrian usurpation led to his banishment, and he spent some years touring in the United States, England and Europe upon the wrongs of his loved country.

At Brampton, on Saturday evening last, the jury returned a verdict of guilty against McWherrill, who stood charged with the brutal double murder at Port Credit a couple of months ago, and he was sentenced to be hanged on June 1st. Walker, his supposed accomplice, was acquitted. Since the trial the provincial lawyer came to have discovered that McWherrill will establish his client's innocence and has moved for a new trial.

Chamberlain, the Winnipeg tory personator, testifying in his own behalf the other day, said that he was stupidly drunk upon election day and that his mind was a perfect blank as to what occurred. The crown prosecutor, however, pointed out that when brought before the court immediately after the election his manner was sufficiently good to enable him to give details of his doings. —The annual Oxford-Cambridge boat race took place over the championship course from Putney to Mortlake on Friday, and the former crew won easily by three and one-half lengths in 21 min. 39 sec. The distance was four and a half miles.

—The Cobourg Post, referring to the proposed Midland baseball league, says:—"The place looks well enough on paper, but experience has taught Cobourg that the Ontario League is a bubble and that it will burst before it has time to expand."

The Lindsay Educational Association. The regular meeting of the Educational Association for March was held Tuesday afternoon at last week at the Separate school, the report in the chair. After routine business, Mr. S. Armour gave a paper on "Ethical Training in Public Schools," of which the main points were: 1. Moral training was related to home, to society and state; 2. Moral training could be given by example, by maxim and authority, and by intelligent training; 3. Moral character was to be formed by a course of instruction in the history of the world; 4. To give moral training literature and history were the best subjects of study, and these should not be taught without affecting the morals of the pupils; 5. A reading book should be selected with this moral culture view, and every school should have a good library, which should be used to supplement the extracts in a reader. In the discussion which followed several interesting phases of the subject were mentioned. Mr. Knight made an announcement regarding the coming teachers' association for this month at Lindsay, which will be held at the Commercial Hotel on Tuesday evening, 27th inst. The next meeting is to be in the Collegiate institute on April 12, and Miss J. Robinson is to read a paper on "Physical Education."

W. C. T. U. Notes. —The plebiscite vote in Prince Edward Island.—The returns show the following vote: Total for the province for prohibition 10,882, total against 3,331, total majority for prohibition 7,551.

It is hardly to be wondered at that it requires thirty-two police to keep in order the inhabitants of a village in the south of Ireland with a population of 1,500, for it actually has fifty-two licensed public houses for the sale of strong drink.

A pleasant story is told of Lady Macdonald, wife of our late premier, who has long been an abstainer. Another lady of high position met her at dinner one day and was surprised to see that she took no wine, and she was asked: "Did you not get out when you entertained the Marquis of Lorne?" "Never" was the prompt reply. "But did you not feel that you must apologize?" "Certainly not. Wine is not a natural beverage, and should rather come in than go out with apology." This answer and that example led the other lady to become an abstainer also.

An object lesson.—A cigarette looks a very innocent little thing—merely a roll of white paper—but inside of that paper is hidden a deadly poison. A teacher in a high school once showed to his scholars the bad effects of cigarette smoking, so he performed an experiment on a cat. The nicotine—the poison—was taken from the tobacco in the cigarette, and was dropped off it upon the cat's tongue. In an instant the poor little creature whined as if in pain, and began to run about the room as if he were in great agony in great agony but it did not suffer very long, for—would you believe it!—in just four minutes the little creature stretched out on the floor and died. Was not that lesson a strong one against tobacco?

Lindsay's Water Supply. For the information of the citizens we publish the report of the special committee of the board of health, read at the last council meeting: EXAMINE.—Your committee appointed to examine into and report on the condition of the water supply of the town of Lindsay, Ontario, at the meeting of the board of health on the 17th February last your committee met at the pump house, and from the engineer in charge obtained the following information:—1. That during the intervals between fires in the town the water is filtered through two large filtering tanks before being pumped into the mains and stand pipes, from which the citizens are supplied with water.

Business was quiet at the western cattle yards Tuesday. Notwithstanding that offerings were light, buying was slow and prices were low. A feature of the market was the buying of steers for the distilleries to fill places in the byres made vacant by the recent sales of Easter cattle. Hogs were weak. The market will be open during the forenoon next Friday, but it is expected that little business will be done, it being Good Friday.

Montreal report that market as in bad shape, with poor prospects. There was very little buying for these Tuesday. Receipts of stuff at the western cattle yards Tuesday were 22 car loads, which included 163 sheep and lambs, 974 hogs and about a dozen calves. For the week ending Saturday, March 17, the receipts were: Cattle, 1,300; lambs and sheep, 325; hogs, 1,663; weight foot, \$41.82. Hardly any milchers offered.
