But in Mr. Wood's proposed examine into and report on the condition of the water supply of the town by the Lindsay Water works Company, beg leave to report that on 27th February last your committee met at the pump house, and from the engineer in charge obtained the following information :- 1. That during the but a high rate is likely to be maintained | county attorneys Mr. Wood proposed to filtered through two large filtering tanks before being pumped into the mains and stand-pipe, from which the citizens are supplied with water. direct from the river without filtration for two reasons: (a) The filters cannot supply sufficient water for the pumps; and (b) that the pressure pumped direct to the hydrants. 3. The engineer, in answer to a question, gave it as his opinion that if the filtering capacity were doubled a sufficient quantity of flitered water would be always available for all purposes. 4. From the engineer we also learned that the filtering material in the tanks has not been renewed since the works were put in in 1892, except that on three occasions some two or three inches of sand on the top had been changed. In consideration of the foregoing and other facts, your committee have come the following conclusions :- 1. That in consequence of the necessity of the manthiy tests of pressure, as provided for by the contract between the company and the town, as well as in consequence of the demand for high pressure during fires, enormous quantities of water are pumped direct from the river into the mains and stand-pipe without filtration of any kind. 2. That assuming that all the water wi:hout the filters being regularly and thoroughly cleaned, it would by no means follow that side cemetery, and the danger of contamination arising therefrom, should be a subject of serious consideration by the local board of health, inasmuch as if any pollution from that source takes mill at Lindsay, or on water in place it is of such a character that the existing system could not, if indeed any system of filters could, remove, so as to be reasonably safe from danger to the health of the citizens. Your committee would suggest that steps be at once taken to have the water submitted to a thorough analysis by the officers of the provincial board of health, and also that a like analysis be pro-oured periodically, and particularly during the ummerand autumn months.
