We have been looking over the January number of the Christian Endeavor, the Chicago organ of the Christian Endeavor Society, and we confess we find it an extremely interesting, lively and stimulating paper. It contains information in regard to that extensive society which we are sure will be interesting to our readers, and if we can transfer a little of their enthusiasm and love for the work to the tepid, half-hearted portion of our own people who are more nominal Catholics, we need not be ashamed to acknowledge our indebtedness to them for a very valuable acquisition. The Christian Endeavor Society is thoroughly organized and embraces the whole country. They call it a "theocratic democracy." The influence of the "grand and noble" president, Rev. Mr. Clarke, who was the originator of the idea and the founder of the society, may be called, at least in a large measure, autocratic. The spirit of loyalty and unbounded devotion to this zealous man is well indicated by a passage in the paper which we are noticing.

"We have supreme loyalty to our grand and noble president, who has never heard such a shout as would go up from the vast array of Endeavorers in tents, halls and churches, at our national conventions, when by a rising vote and true American cheer he would be swept by a tidal wave of affirmatives into an office which but faintly expresses the gratitude of the churches for the messages from God which he has brought to us.

We have just received an attractive little pamphlet from Hon. John Dryden, the Ontario minister of agriculture, entitled "The Pioneer Farmer and the Wabigoon country, Rainy River District." The attention of the department having recently been called to this hitherto unsettled region, Mr. Dryden determined to establish what he termed a "pioneer farm," to demonstrate in a practical manner the country's agricultural capabilities. The experiment so far has been very successful, and this pamphlet, giving general information regarding the section, which is now open for settlement, is very interesting. It is illustrated and contains a map of the district. This information will be very opportune in view of the increasing demand at the present time for cheap land, especially on the part of young men of small capital, the sons of farmers, who desire to secure farms and homes of their own. Such a sheet by all means investigate the Wabigoon country and other unsettled portions of Ontario before turning attention elsewhere. Ontario still has vast resources at her command—a heritage intended for her own people—and presents advantages unsurpassed by any province by far foreign lands. When the Toronto express, in charge of Conductor Greaves and Driver George Mills, arrived at Goodwood last Friday night, a number of Lindsay people aboard expressed satisfaction at the fact that two or three along the platform and swayed their heads in the air, and the beauty of the moon shone bright and clear, the far-away stars blinked and twinkled, and all nature seemed to breathe peace and rest.
