BOARD OF EDUCATION AN INTERESTING SESSION ON

TUESDAY EVENING.

The regular monthly meeting of the . oard of education was held Tuesday evenng in the council chamber. The members present were Chairman J. R. McNeillie and Messrs. Stewart, Flavelle, R. Kennedy, Pilkie, Deacon, McLaughlin, Anderson, Staples and Dr. Lynch. Inspector Kuight and Headmaster Broderick were so in attendanc.

Chairman McNeillie said Inspector Knight had made a number of recom-mendations in his report that deserved careful consideration. The board having a responsible principal, the committee thought it wise to refer the matters to him to report upon. As for the result of the arithmetic exam., the committee came to the conclusion that 6i per cent. of correct answers was a very creditable showing. He would say to the board that he thought they had, perhaps, made a mistake in re-introducing slates in the schools—the pupils should be given every chance to use the implements for writing they would be called apon to use in after life. be called upon to use in after life. The committee's report was then adopted, with a few amendments, as above.
