

A Dastardly Crime Committed Last Tuesday Evening.

James Agnew, a Retired Farmer, Shot Down at his own Stable Door.


Perpetrated in Lindsay-The Deed Evidently Committed by Some Person Well Acquainted with his Victim's Habits-Robbery the Motive, as the Dead Man's Pockets were Rifled and his Watch Taken.

Early Wednesday morning the people of our town were thrown into a state of excitement, mingled with horror, by the news that a most foul murder had been committed in their midst Taesday night, the victim being a retired farmer, named James Agnew, aged 75 years, a resident of the east ward for the past 12 years. Various rumors blew about fast and thick, and say that if he had raid anything to hurt at first it was reported that the assassin hended, but this was disproved some time later when our reporter arrived at the scene of the terrible tragedy.

The Victim. James Agnew, the murdered man, was well known throughout the township of Ops. He came to this country from the ployed for some time past. When our United States in 1855, after a seven years' citizens heard of the chief's action United States in 1855, after a seven years' stay there, and located on the 100 acre farm owned by him about three miles from Lindsay, on the Bobcaygeon road, opposite the farm of his brother, Robert Agnew, and, like the latter, hewed out a home for himself, improved his land year by year, and prospered, winning at the same time the respect and esteem of all with whom he came in contact by his integrity of purpose and straightforward

conduct in all the relations of life. About twelve years' ago, as stated, the leceased, owing to his advancing years, decided to give up farming and retire to Lindsay providing he could secure a suitable tenant. This he succeeded in doing, and moving in, he purchased a comfort able brick dwelling in the east ward where he has since resided with his aged partner. Here his many good qualities speedily won for him a large circle of friends—not alone among the congregation of the Queen-st. church, of which he was a consistent member-but in all classes of the community.

Discovery of the Crime. The murdered man spent last evening at home with his wife, as usual, and about 9 o'clock, or a few minutes later, took down his lantern from its nail and proceeded to the stable, about 100 feet from the house, to fix up his horse for the night. That the murderer knew this was his invariable custom will be shown later. Usually the task occupied him about half-an-hour, and | Chief Bell the startling and satisfying inhis wife, thinking him longer away than customary, at last went to the rear door of the dwelling and rattled a loose paling on the fence-a well-known signal for attracting his attention when employed in the stable during the day. She then entered the house and waited some minutes longer, until at last, fearing that perhaps he uad been kicked by the horse, she decided to go to the stable and see if anything was the matter. At the stable door she stumbled over her husband's body, then, almost crazed by anxiety and alarm, she made her way to the residence of Mr. James L. Shannon, milkman, a short distance away. and implored him to come and see what was the matter with her husband. Mr.



the barn, when a brief inspection satisfied him that a most brutal murder had been mpted, if not committed. A mes-er was at once dispatched for Dr. W. H. Clarke, the family physician, who upon arrival pronounced that life had been extinct for some time. His examination of the body revealed the fact that president; A. J. Kerr, president; D. Ray nation of the body revealed the fact that death had been caused by a pistol bullet which had entered a few inches from the left ear, the weapon having been fired at such close range that the flesh was blackened and discolored by the powder. The next step taken was to send for Coroner Poole and Chief of Police Bell, who reached the scene of the orime about 2 o'clock this morning. Upon examining the body they found that the dead man's watch had been wrenched violently from the vest pooket, as the chain had been broken, leaving the bar, with a few links attached to the button-hole. That the pookets had also been thoroughly rified was made plain by the fact that two pooket-books were found near the body minus some \$15, while a number of papers were found scattered about on the snow. After taking note of all the

circumstances Coroner Poole ordered the removal of the body to the house to await an inquest during the day. Probable Movements of the Murderer.

Chief of Police Bell again repaired to the scene at day-light, having taken the precaution to leave a man on the watch to see that nothing likely to afford a clue to the assassia was disturbed. Tracks in the deep snow surrounding the lot enabled him to trace very clearly the movements of the murderer while contemplating the foul crime and awaiting the appearance of his victim. A glance at the plan given below will show that the deed had been gone about in leisurely fashion, the dotted

line denoting the tracks.

The murderer had first approached the fence on the south side of the stable, in plan marked A), with the idea of entering there, but changing his mind, had regained the street, stopping at the spot marked B, as indicated by the tramped condition of the snow. His next move was to the gateway designated B, where he had evidently remained some little time, as the snow was firmly trodden down and liberally besprinkled with tobacco juice. There he probably halted till his victim had entered the stable, when he lesped the fence and took up the position at the corner of the stable marked D, the door being in the angle shown. No doubt as the unfortunate man was in the act of closing the door the murderer, who was not more than a few feet away, extended his arm and fired the ffatal bullet that robbed a human being of life and impress-

Possible Clues. The footmarks found by Chief Ball this morning are of comparatively small size,

and showed the impress of a rabber or It is conjectured that the weapon used was a 32 calibre revolver, as several empty shells wers found. When the post-mortem examination is completed, and the fatal bullet extracted by the medical men, the correctness of the surmise will be established or banished.

The watch taken from the murdered man's person was a silver stem-winder. hunting case pattern, with a Hampden movement, and under the flange of the back case Jeweller J. T. Petty had scratched he repair number "1851." The Suspected Murderer Arrested.

In the account of the crime in Wednes-

day's edition of THE EVENING POST WE noted the arrest of a youth named John Carney, of the east ward, Chief Ball declaring that he had sufficient evidence to warrant the action. The arrest was made about 10 30 a.m. at the farm of Mr. Henry Logie, a short distance from the scene of the tragedy, where Carney had been emopinion was generally expressed that the boy could have had no hand in planning or executing such a cold-blooded crime, and that the chief and his assistants should look elsewhere or the real perpetrator of the horrible deed might escape The after developments proved that Chief Bell knew his business, and went about it in the way best calculated to bring out the true history of the terrible affair. After lodging young Carney safely in the lock-up Chief Bell started out to verify, if possible, several of the very slender clues in his possession. He ascertained that young Carney had been in town the previous evening, and on his way back to Logie's about 9 30 he had been accompanied as far as Mr. J. R. O'Neill's store, in the east ward, by several companions. It was also learned that before parting he had fired several shots from a revolver he was known to often carry. This information set the chief thinking hard, owing to the fact that some empty shells had been found near Agnew's house the morning after the tragedy. Where was the weapon-it was not on young Carney's person, as he had been searched when arrested; his pockets had only contained \$1.05 and a collection of odds and ends such as most young fellows carry. After considering matters carefully Chief Bell resolved to take a bold course, and interviewed the prisoner's brother, Patrick, at the family home just across the boundary separating the east ward from the township of Ops. Just what influence was brought to bear we know not, but the young man imparted to formation that he had seen his brother that morning at Logie's and received from him a pistol—and also a watch.
