THE ISLANDS SWEPT. A Hurricane Said to Have Caused Immense Destruction. Victoria, B.C., March 24. - The Canadian-Australian steamer Warrimoo reports encountering a terrific hurricane on the 4th inst. She then being one day out of Suva, Fiji. So fierce was the storm that the steamer was forced to slow down for 40 consecutive hours. The crew and passengers were all saved, but the vessel sustained considerable damage. It is believed that the hurricane was caused by a storm which passed over the islands in the Pacific on the 3rd inst. The Warrimoo had a comparatively uneventful voyage.

JUDGE THOMAS HUGHES DEAD. Author of 'Tom Brown's School Days,' 'Tom Brown at Oxford,' etc. London, March 22. - Judge Thomas Hughes, F.S.A., B.A., author of 'Tom Brown's School Days,' died at Brighton on the 21st inst. Judge Hughes was born in 1823, and educated at Rugby and Oxford. He was called to the bar in 1848. He was elected as Radical M.P. for Lambeth in 1852, and for Finsbury in 1858. In the following year he was made a Q.C. In 1870 he made a tour of the United States and Canada. He was the author of 'Tom Brown's School Days,' 'Tom Brown at Oxford,' and 'Life of Livingstone,' and other works. He was appointed a County Court Judge in 1883, and in the following year he was made a Q.C. in the Antislavery cause and was a well-known lecturer on co-operation, workmen's clubs, and other social subjects.

He Wants the Armenian Patriarch to Admit Responsibility for Outbreaks. Constantinople, March 19. - The Porte has demanded of the Armenian Patriarch that he should admit responsibility for the outbreaks in Armenia, and that he should undertake to put down the outbreaks in the event of their being written in a red book, the purpose of which will be to show that the statements in Armenia are false. The Porte has also informed the Patriarch that his continuance in office will provoke further massacres. The Armenian Patriarch can resign his office only with the consent of the National Council, which has been deputed to call together a number of deputations called upon by the Patriarch on Sunday and Monday and to present them to the Porte in office. The members of the mixed council have threatened to resign if the Patriarch resists. Funds are being raised to force the Patriarch to resign.

Mr. Hardy's County Councils Bill Amended.

HAWKERS' AND PEDLARS' LICENSES

BILLS TO AMEND THE MUNICIPAL ACT AND TO PROVIDE FOR PUBLIC SLAUGHTER HOUSES - Further Protection of Game - Work in Committee - Second Reading.

The Local Legislature yesterday devoted two sessions entirely to the consideration of the Government's proposals, among them Mr. Hardy's bill to reduce the number of county councillors. The Municipal Committee far-reachingly considered the bill regarding city councils.

An Act to amend the Municipal Act - Mr. O'Neil proposed an amendment of extending the powers with regard to the licensing of hawkers and pedlars, so as to include persons peddling various carpets, and upholstery and other articles.

An Act to amend the Assessment Act - Mr. Taylor provided that persons liable to assessment for personal property shall furnish sworn statements of the value thereof to the Assessment Commissioner under the penalty of \$20 for every day during which default continues. It empowers the county judge to appoint two or more competent persons, to be known as assessment accountants. The accountants may, upon the order of the county judge, examine the books, accounts and vouchers of persons furnishing these statements and report to the judge.

An Act to amend the Municipal Act - Mr. Taylor. The object of this act is to make it clear that when it is applied upon application to a municipal councillor that his election has resulted from the deputy registrar's refusal to register a qualified elector, if the judge is satisfied that the result of the election is affected, he may not only unseat the person elected, and direct that the costs be paid by him, but may give the seat to the candidate claiming it.

An Act to make further provision for the further protection of game provides that no person shall at any time kill or capture deer while in the water, and that no person who is a resident of Ontario or Quebec shall at any time kill or capture moose, elk, reindeer, or other deer without a license signed by the Chief Fish and Game Warden and countersigned by the deputy registrar.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Mr. Hardy's bill to reduce the number of county councillors, and the Commissioner submitted several amendments to the measure. He proposed to make it apply to all counties and had altered his schedule of starting with counties of 25,000 population and upwards.

Major Hincott (Lincoln) spoke strongly against the measure. He thought the Commissioner should refer the measure to the county councils, who might be able to offer the Government some amendments. The member for Lincoln was loudly applauded by the Opposition when he concluded his pointed attack on the measure.

The discussion on the bill continued until 6 o'clock, when the House rose. After recess the House again went into committee on Mr. Hardy's bill to reduce the number of County Councillors.

Mr. Hardy moved that the following clauses constitute the commission to divide the counties: Benson of Northampton, the counties of Victoria, Wilkinson of Lennox, Senkler of Lanark, Cresoor of Grey, Jones of Brant, Horne of Essex, Bell of Kent, O'Brien of Hamilton, and the counties of Lambton and Senkler of Lincoln, the two last-named to fill vacancies.

Martin v. Haubner, appeal from Ontario Court of Appeal; dismissed with costs. Scouler v. McColl, appeal from Supreme Court of British Columbia; dismissed with costs. Wilson v. Land Security Co., appeal from Ontario Court of Appeal; dismissed with costs. Lamson v. Rogers, appeal from Ontario Court of Appeal; dismissed with costs.

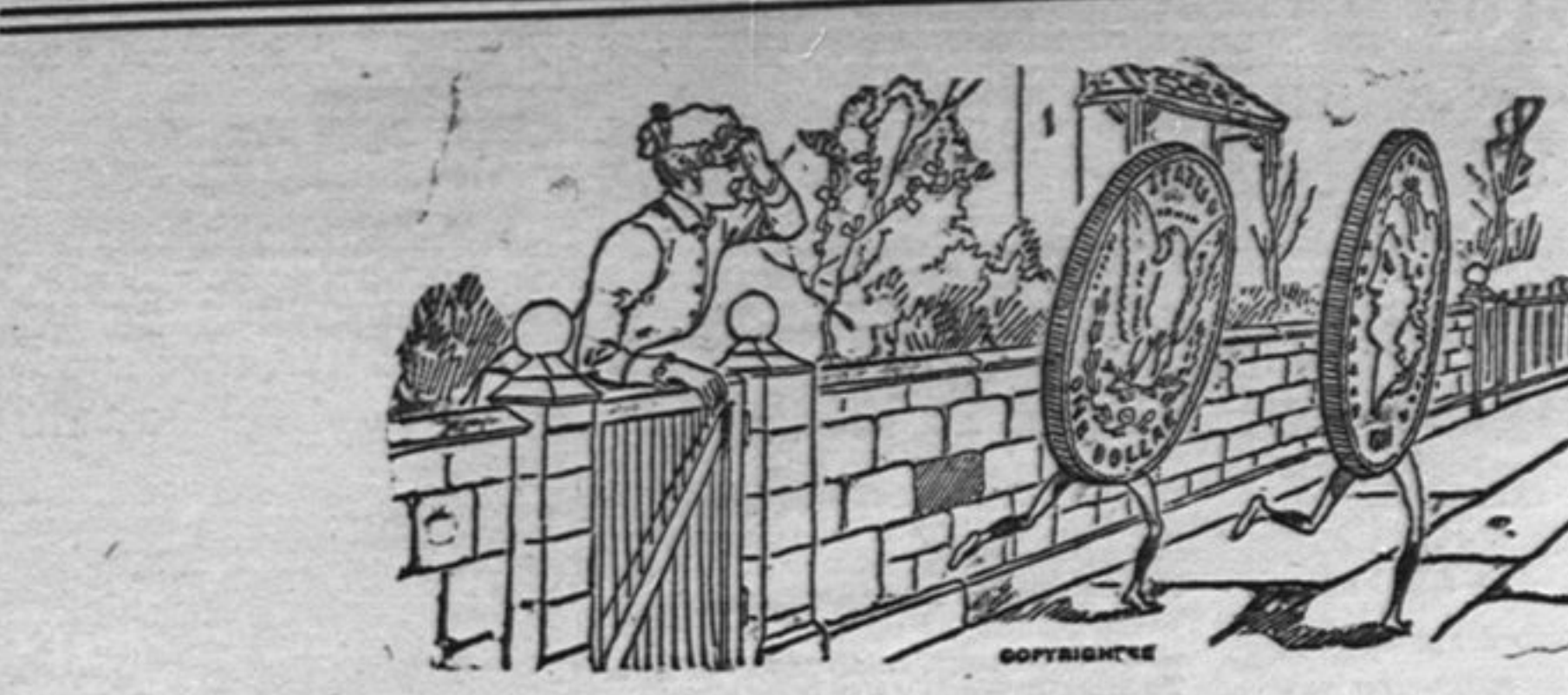
