A Startling Story From Havana Via Key West.

SPANISH OFFICIALS- CHARGED

The Statement to El Yara, a Respectable Cuban Paper, to Be Placed Before the U. S. Court of Enquiry-Spain Buys Warships-Another Squadron

Key West, March 5 .- From Havana yesterday came the most astounding story that has yet been told concerning the blowing up of the Maine. In effect, it is that the explosion was done by the directors, and with the full knowledge of responsible Spanish officials on the island, who, to conceal their crime, took the life of the man who did the work, after having paid him \$20,000.

Spain in Funds. The Government of Spain seems to have funds, for it is understood to be paying a large part of the purchase money in cash, giving good security for the balance, these being the only terms upon which

the Armstrongs would deal. Some weeks ago Spain attempted to purchase ships and supplies in England on credit from prominent firms having close relations with the Government here, but after inquiries the firms refused to give credit. Since then Spain has raised funds from some unknown sources.

Diplomats in London express the belief that French financiers are helping the Spanish Government. It is known that Spain is trying to purchase three other ships which are being built by the Armstrongs, but she has not yet succeeded in making a bargain, consequently there is still time if the United States wishes to forestall her.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

The Figures Now Show Liberals 50, Conservatives 42, Patrons 1, Vacant 1-Other Interesting News.

Toronto, March 8 .- The figures of the official majorities obtained at the recent provincial election continue to come in, and are now practically all to hand. The only unexpected development is the official declaration of the returning officer for West Huron, giving Mr. Garrow the election by a majority of eight, and temporarily at least sending up to 50 the number of Liberals elected. The deputy re turning officers for three sub-divisions in West Huron had not signed their returns, and the absence of these converted a Conservative majority of one or two into a minority of eight, the returning officer, of course, having no option in the matter. Naturally Mr. Beck, the Conservative candidate, has asked for a recount, and it will remain for the County Judge to dispose of the matter. In the absence of a knowledge of the details of the case, it is not unreasonable to suppose that on the recount the seat will be held by the Conservative candidate.

West Elgin Recount. In the case of West Elgin the advantage of the recount is all on the side of the Conservative candidate. Judge Ermatinger has counted in a number of rejectin the margin preceding the name instead of in the blank following the names, and the net result has been to deprive Mr. Macnish of ten of his scanty majority of eleven. Last night his majority had gone down to one. The recount will be finished this morning, and it is clearly among the possibilities that Mr. Macnish will be counted out and the seat given to the Conservative candidate. In that case a scrutiny will be held to determine the final possession of the seat.

San Francisco, March 8.-Mabel Keating, known from New York to San Francisco as the "Queen of Pickpockets," was shot and fatally wounded by Jerry Sullivan, a city hall janitor, in the saloon of her husband, who also received a bullet from the same pistol. Sullivan entered Keating's saloon and called for a drink. Before serving him Keating demanded payment of a bill alleged to be due. Sullivan made an insulting reply, which brought Mrs. Keating to the front. Her remarks enraged Sullivan, who drew a

revolver and shot her in the left breast, inflicting a mortal wound. Then Sullivan turned his revolver on Keating and sent a bullet through the back of his neck. Mabel Keating is stated by the police

The Colonial Office authorities suggest that the flag was possibly raised with the cognizance of Canada, with the object of marking Great Britain's claim, and not with any idea of violating the territory of the United
