Farmers Need Have No Losses of Fruit if They Carefully Follow Instruc tions and Spray Trees at the Righ

The report of the Superintendent of ince of Ontario for 1898 has just been received, and contains a good deal of valuable information for the farmer and fruit grower as to the means of procuring sound and saleable fruit. The ravages of insect pests of late years have been the causs of enormous losses to the owners of orchards, and the Ontario government have called in the aid or solonce to counteract the evil. and give to the farmers practical examples of how injury from this cause

the entire efficacy of the system, recording in detail the results of experimental spraying conducted during the past season at thirty different points throughout the province, which was mapped out into three routes, so as to test the system under every variety of local conditions, and extend a knowledge of its operations as widely as possible. The greatest interest was taken by the people of the localities selected, the attendance at the spraying numbering 3,538 persons, in addition to many subsequent visitors to orchards sprayed-the number being 700 more than that of the year previous and over double the attendance of 1896. The plan was to spray when the buds were swelling, then just before the opening of the blossoms, and lastly, when the blossoms had fallen, at intervals of about twelve days, until the danger of scab was passed. The result was a very marked improvement the yield was made, and all scabby, wormy or other defective fruit rejected, and in many cases from 90 to 100 per cent of clean, sound fruit was obtained. The season, owing to the long-continued heat and drouth, was ravages of the caterpillar and other vermin proved extremely destructive in all unsprayed orchards, the contrast between the healthy condition of the trees and fruits subjected to treatment and those where the pests had been

unmolested being very apparent. To bring the necessity of the spraying process home to a larger number of farmers than could avail themselves of the opportunity of witnessing the experiments, an exhibit of sprayed and unsprayed fruit was made at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition, which attracted much attention.

The report, which is a valuable exposition of the advantages of spraying, may be had on application to the Ontario department of agriculture. Spraying experiments for the current year are now being arranged for, and the routes laid out. A list of the orchards selected, and the dates of opera-

A bulletin giving information as to the more injurious insects pests, and the best methods of suppressing them by spraying, is in course of prepara-tion by the department of agriculture, Toronto, and every progressive farmer should apply for a copy.

11th of February last trusts or com binations were formed in the United States which had an alleged capital of \$1,238,507,000 in common stock and \$486,591,000 in preferred stock, a total of over \$1,700,000,000. These figures indicate a perfect flood of inflated and watered stocks let loose on unwary investors. But these figures do not tell the whole story. Within a month after Feb. 11 new trusts were formed which issued stock to the amount of \$844,800,000, or about half the amount floated during the entire preceding thirteen months. If this rate of profgress continues the year will show a record of trusts amounting to the gigantic sum of five billions of dollars, and disastrous collapses in the values of stocks will certainly follow.

A new women's society has been formed in New York city. It has adopted the title of 'The Women's Home Improvement Club,' and will act upon the sensible principle that the best way to reform the world is to begin with the home. The great object to be attained, as set forth in the constitution of the society is "the education and the instraction of married women in the 'art of making their homes comfort-"able and happy, to the end that they, "the said homes, may be attractive to their husbands and conducive to the health and future prosperity of their "children."
