THE RATHBUN CO'S MILL WILL HUM THIS SEASON LOUDER THAN EVER. The New Machinery and Improvements Double the output in Every Department of the Mill - Between 85 and 100 Hands will be Employed this Season.

Mr. G. H. M. Baker, local manager for the Rathbun Co., has planned to make the 1899 cut of the lumber mill his aim secured the consent of the firm to incur a large expenditure for new machinery.

The stock manufactured at the mill comprises lumber, shingles, ties, barrel heading, broom handles in the rough, lath, ash factory sundries, post and rails, etc.

At present it is Manager Baker's intention to keep the lumber mill running day and night for at least three months. About 85 hands are employed in and about the mill when it is operated on the day schedule.
