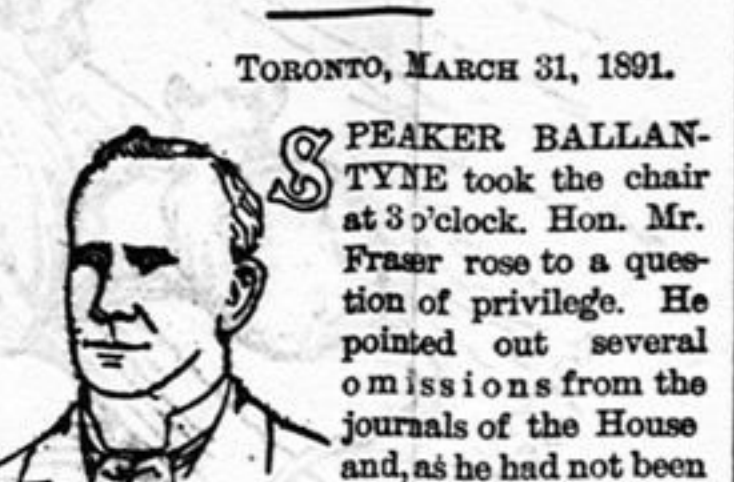

REGULATIONS. 1. All entries must be received by the secretary before the day of show, and may be mailed to him or left at his store, 151-153, Lindsay, Gt. Gatties may be made till 11 o'clock on the day of show, on payment of \$1 extra. 2. The horses to be shown will be awarded must stand in Lindsay once a week during the season, and horses shown in General Purpose class when prize will be awarded must weigh more than 1450 lbs. and the judges will have the right to rule out any animal if they think they are not worthy of a prize. 3. Horses not entered in the proper class shall be ruled out, and horses not entered will be kept for service in the township during the season. 4. Pedigrees of both horses and bulls must be produced to the satisfaction of the Judges and Secretary on fair day before awarding prizes. Prizes will not be paid until October. 5. The animals must be on the ground by one o'clock, p.m. on day of show, and will have to remain on the ground until four o'clock. If not on the ground by 1:30 will not be judged. 6. The Canadian Post. CHARLES D. BARR, PROPRIETOR. ONTARIO LEGISLATURE. First Session—Seventh Parliament. TORONTO, MARCH 31, 1891.



PEAKER BALLANTYNE took the chair at 3 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Fraser rose to a question of privilege. He pointed out several omissions from the journals of the House and, as he had not been able by private complaints to the officers of the House to have the matter set right for the future. A number of petitions were presented, and bills read a first time. \$300,000 of an interior appropriation was transmitted by the Lieutenant-Governor and the message was read by the Speaker. The debate on the budget was resumed by Mr. Sol. White, and was continued by Messrs. Balfour, McCleary, and Waters, who moved the adjournment of the debate. The House adjourned at 6 o'clock.

TORONTO, APRIL 1, 1891.—The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. Among the petitions presented was one from the County Council of Bruce praying that the Assessment Act be amended to give rural municipalities the option of raising their assessments on a basis of valuation. The Speaker ruled on the reading of Mr. McKellar's petition, objected to by Mr. Fraser when presented. The ruling in effect was that if a member objected a petition could not be read until the Clerk of the House had examined same to see if it contained any objectionable matter. A number of bills were read a first time, one of them being respecting the profession of stenographers. The act grants a degree under certain conditions. The report of the Crown Lands was brought down by Mr. Waters, who resumed the debate on the budget, and was followed by Messrs. Mismacpall, Cleland, Campbell (East Algoma), Charlton, Meacham, MacKenzie, Whitney, Wood (Bram), Magwood, Clancy, and Ross. A debate moved, adjournment of the debate, and the House adjourned at midnight.

TORONTO, APRIL 2, 1891.—The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock, and laid on the table the certificate of election of Mr. Gilbert McKee, as representative of South Grey. A number of bills were read a first time. Mr. Ross, to consider and revise the high school laws. Mr. Ross. To amend the law as to barristers and solicitors in certain cases.—The Attorney-General. REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. COUN. WINTERS, chairman, read the report, which referred mainly to leases of Queen's Quays lots about to expire. REPORT OF POLICE COMMITTEE. COUN. Dep.-revere BYRANS, chairman, presented the report, which referred mainly to leases of Queen's Quays lots about to expire. REPORT OF FIRE AND WATER COMMITTEE. Dep.-revere KYLIE, chairman, presented a brief report recommending that the sinking of an electric light be placed on St. Patrick-st. He was not entertained. The committee intended visiting the wards with a view to placing additional lights. The report was adopted.

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LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL. REGULAR SESSION—A LOT OF COMMUNICATIONS—CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES—RAILWAY FACILITIES—SANITARY MATTERS. The town fathers assembled in regular session Monday evening, in the council chamber. All the members were present, Mayor Walters in the chair. Promptly at eight o'clock the clerk read the minutes of last regular and special informal meeting, which were on motion confirmed by the council.

COMMUNICATIONS. From W. L. Walsh, mayor of Orangeville, asking the council's co-operation by sending a deputation to press upon the settlement of the justice of recognizing such municipalities as had liberally aided railways to which government aid was not extended.—Laid on table. From John Castleg, secretary of the Trent Valley canal association, relative to a meeting to be held in Peterboro on the 28th inst., to agitate for an early completion of that portion of the canal which is contemplated by the commissioners.—Laid on table. From John Head, secretary of the central dairy commission for the year 1890-91, asking for the usual grant of \$125.—Laid on table. From George Roberts, asking that a crossing be constructed opposite his property in order to give a better street and bridge committee.

From R. A. Pogue, giving notice of his intention to erect a shop and dwelling.—Referred to street and bridge committee. From Barren & McLoughlin, asking that a deputation be appointed to press upon the Ontario legislature the importance of that the construction of the Postypool, Lindsay & Bobcaygeon railway. The communication suggested that Mr. Wm. McDonnell be a member of the deputation, and that the committee be authorized to do all that in their power to secure the completion of the benefits to be derived.—Laid on table. From Jas. Deacon, tendering his resignation as a member of the board of health, and stating that his reasons for resigning were the same as those given by Mr. Irwin.—Received and filed. From Mr. Callahan, proposing that a crossing be built opposite his new house on Fairview-avenue.—Referred to street and bridge committee.

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
