The Speaker ruled on the reading of Mr. McKellar's petition, objected to by Mr. Fraser when presented. The ruling in effect was that if a member objected a petition could not be read until the Clerk of the House had examined same to see if it contained any objectionable matter. A number of bills were read a first time, one of them being respecting the profession of stenographers. The act grants a degree under certain conditions. The report of the Crown Lands was brought down. Mr. Waters then resumed the debate on the budget, and was followed by Messrs. Miscampbell, Cleland, Campbell (East Algoma), Charlton, Meacham, Mackenzie, Whitney, Wood (Brant), Magwood, Clancy, and Ross. Mr. Preston moved the

adjournment of the debate, and the House adjourned at midnight. TORONTO, April 2, 1891.—The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. The Speaker ruled on the point raised by Mr. Fraser concerning the journals of the House, and laid down the practice to be followed anent recording reports. Mr. Gilmour's act incorporating the town of Mimico was read a first time, as was the Niagara Falls electric railway bill. The budget debate was resumed by Mr. Preston, and he was followed by Messrs. Metcalfe, Meredith, and Hon. Mr. Hardy closed the debate and the House went into committee of supply. An item was carried and the House rose at 6 o'clock. After recess, the bill to increase the efficiency of the local courts of the county of York was read a third time. These bills were read a second time: To amend the Act respecting the federation of the University of Toronto and University College with other universities and colleges.-Mr. Ross. To amend the act respecting dentistry.-Mr. Ross. To consolidate and revise the high

school laws.—Mr. Ross. To amend the laws as to barristers and solicitors in certain cases.-The Attorney-General. The House then went into Committee of Supply and after passing a large number of items the committee rose. The House adjourned at

TORONTO, April 3, 1891.—The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock, and laid on the table the certificate of election of Mr. Gilbert Mc-Kechnie, as representative of South Grey. A number of bills were read a first time. In answer to Mr. Monk, the Attorney-General said that any county which passed a by-law to that effect could introduce the Torrens system of land transfer, as it existed in Toronto and the County of York. At first in the latter place the system showed a deficit, but now it had a substantial surplus to its credit. Mr. McLenaghan moved: "That, in the opinion of this House, greater local facilities should be given to farmers' sons by which they could secure a better education in their own calling than is afforded them under the provisions of the law as it now stands." In a lengthy speech he supported his motion, and said his idea of the remedy for the poor technical educational facilities of the farmer was that power be given to the municipalities to establish township schools for the study of agricultural subjects. The Minister of Education followed in the speech pointing out that what the farmers wanted was a general English education, and if he desired to specialize he could do so in the high schools, where agricultural chemistry was taught, or at the Agricultural College. A Terrible Tragedy in Dakota. The following telegram appeared Monday's dailies, and created much interest as the parties are former residents of this county: "WINNIPEG, April 5 .- From Pembina, N. D., comes a murderous tale. A Miss D. Bartlett had been seduced by one McConnell, who recently got married. Her two brothers, Fred and Tom, on Saturday drove out to where McConnell was staying and the latter shot McConnell twice. McConnell ran to the house, and a man, upon attempting to disarm the infuriated brothers, received a shot in the breast and another in the arm. McConnell started out to run on the prairie, and another brother started after him in a buggy, followed by Tom Bartlett and a friend named Irwin. The latter was shot in the groin and afterwards McConnell was hit twice. After the shooting the Bartlett brothers returned home, and while Tom attended to the horses Fred went into the house and shot himself through the head, dying instantly. Tom was arrested and it is feared he will be lynched. McConnell cannot live and Hill and Irwin are danger-ously hurt." The Bartlett boys formerly lived in Lindsay and are brothers of Mr. C. Bartlett, butcher. They were living on a farm in Dakota, some fifteen miles from Pembina, and McConnell, who comes from Bobcaygeon, had been living some time with them. The father and mother of the Bartletts returned to Ontario a year or two ago; and since then the young girl has been keeping house for her brothers. McConnell, who had taken up a neighboring farm, was quite at home in the house until last week, when he married another young woman.
