Since the above meet ing the Rev. Dr. Carman, general auperin dent of the Methodist church in Canada met the officials of the three southern circuits of the Uxbridge districts. There was very full discussion of the stand taken by the three circuits. It was thought by many that the entire district could more probably secure a re-transfer than could the three listricts alone.
