Reply to Mr. John Campbell of Mari-[To the Editor of THE POST.]

SIR,-In THE CANADIAN POST of the 10th inst. there appeared a communication from Mr. John Campbell in which he says, "We were told by a pork packer a few months ago that he was willing to contract for a large number of hogs, so as to realize to the farmer some \$7 per 100 los. dressed weight." I expect that I am the packer referred to, although the statement is so reely correct as to time, as he said "a few months ago." The letter referred to was written on the 1st of June, 1890, and In it I said "I would contract now for a quantity, say 10,000 or 20,000 hogs, at those prices," (\$5 per one hundred live weight or \$7 per one hundred dressed. The price was right, but I omitted to say when they were to be delivered. I should have said to be delivered in June, July, August and September as those are our summer packing months, and it was for delivery in those months that I was offering to contract, not for a moment thinking that anyone would construe my offer as being made for an unlimited period of siderable feeling between the oarsmen. If I had space I could give you the

reason that hogs are so much higher in price in summer than in winter, showing also that the farmers would study their own interests by fattening and selling their hogs in summer.

Mr. Campbell asks "What has become of the pork packer's promises?" When I made that offer I was both willing and able to carry it out, but as no one came forward to accept it I was forced to buy in carload lots all over the country, at even higher prices. In Toronto and Western Ontario I bought a great many cars at from 51c to 5ge f.o.b., and for one lot of four cars from Tilbury Centre, in the County of Essex, I paid \$6 delivered at Ottawa.

Mr. Campbell says, "Have they put their heads together and fixed the price? Does ft not look like it! But how do they sell the bacon, hams and mess pork? We find they go up according to Chicago values and the working classes who are the consumers 'pay the piper."

In reply to that, I would say that I am selling those articles, (excepting mess pork, of which I handle very little), at the same prices that I have been selling them all winter. We have not advanced our all winter. We have not advanced our

no one can say what the prices will be a month hence. As far as "putting their heads together

to fix prices" is concerned, I give you my word that in my experience of over thirty years in this business, I have never known of any attempt on the part of the packers to fix prices either in buying hogs or in selling the meats, and it is as far from the actual facts of the case to say that the packers combine for that purpose, as to say that the farmers of Mariposa have combined with the farmers of Emily to see what kind of product will give the best return for time and labor spent on it, is right, that is business, also to get the highest price for all he has to sell, but I fail to see where his sympathies for the "working classes who are the consumers and pay the piper" come in when he talks about selling cattle at \$7 per 100 on foot. I am afraid the working classes would not be able to buy much beef, as that price alive would mean about 20 cents per pound for steak.

His sympathies for the censumer are like the coal dealer, who, getting up one very cold morning, said "God heip the poor," and then called to his man to put the price of coal up six pence per cwt. COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, April 16, 1891. Toronto Live Stock Market.

The receipts last week were 997 head of cattle, 117 sheep and 854 hogs..... The receipts Tuesday were 20 loads, including 100 calves, 60 sheep and lambs and 200 hogs. There was a fair demand for good butchers' cattle at from \$3.50 to \$4.75 per 100 pounds, and nearly all the pens were cleared. Calves were in fair demand at \$3 to \$10, according to size and condition. The market for sheep and lambs was rather slow at \$4 to \$5.50. Spring lambs are in more active demand. The market for hogs was fairly active at unchanged prices.

Toronto Street Market. The receipts were almost nil to-day owing to the rain, and prices are nominal at quotations. A few loads of hay offered; choice timothy is worth \$12 to \$13. Straw nominal at \$8 to \$9 for bundled, and at \$6 for loose. 
