The true reason for depreciation of farm lands in Ontario is the barriers in the shape of high tariff walls by which Canada has been surrounded by the United States -our natural market-in retaliation for the iniquitous National Policy that was introduced to protect our Canadian manufacturers as a reward for the election funds they were expected to furnish the government. The late Mr. Daniel Smith was offered by Mr. James Colville \$11,000 cash for his fine farm in Clarke of 116 acres about ten years ago. Last week it was offered at auction after extensive advertising and

the highest bid was \$5,500. For the Brodie estate adjoining Bowmanville an offer of \$10,000 was made about the same time and a few weeks ago it was sold for about \$7,000. The Bradshaw farm of 110 acres two miles from town was sold some years ago for \$80 an acre, and a few months ago it was bought by Mr. S. Snowden for \$49

GREWSOME

IT APPEARS TO BE THE SPOOK OF LONG DEAD OLD RECLUSE.






