Daniel Witt, who served under Marshal Rucker in the county of Waterloo, died near Kingston a few days ago. The parents in Kieff district, Russia, are said to be selling their children for a few rubles prior to emigrating.

The authorities of Saxony have prohibited the killing of birds of prey, except by the use of the pole-axe, knives excepted. Xavier Tessier committed suicide at Wallaceburg, Ont., on Wednesday night by jumping into the river from one of the bridges.

Rubin Pasha has recovered the immense sum of money he was forced to abandon when he left the equatorial provinces with Stanley. A cyclone devastated seven miles of country in Fatima county, Arkansas, killing one man and seriously injuring a large number.

A Melbourne jury on Wednesday returned a verdict of wilful murder against Deaming for killing his wife recently at Windsor, a suburb of Melbourne. Italy is very strongly supporting the English resistance to the acceptance by the khedive of the Turkish firman. The situation continues to be very strained.

The London newspapers generally condemn the leniency of the sentence given to Montagu, and urge the appointment of a guardian for her remaining children. The trial of Martin Reinhardt, charged with the murder of a man at Hertz, in New Germany, was concluded at Berlin Thursday. The prisoner was acquitted, though no denial of the deed was made, the jury finding the accused innocent of the crime.

A London dressmaker has recognized a portrait of Deeming as that of a man who courted her under the name of Lawson in the autumn of 1888, and she has admitted that he had committed two of the Whitechapel murders attributed to Jack the Ripper.

The Canada Pacific railway has notified its agents all along the line that it does not intend to store more grain for storage. There are almost two million bushels stored in the elevators there for the opening of navigation, and the elevators are filled to their capacity.

The youngest son of the late Sir Hugh Allan came of age April 2, and the provisions of the will are now being carried out. The youngest son gets six-twentieths of the profits of the business, his brothers, H. Montague and Bryce J. Allan, getting seven-twentieths each. The estate is worth \$7,000,000.

Last year Mrs. John Hankison of Aylmer, Ont., kept an exact count of the quantity of butter she made from her six cows during the time they came in until they were dried up. It amounted to just 1,400 lbs. at an average price she received of 12 1/2 cents per lb., and she had a total of \$252, or an average of \$42 for each cow.

All the managers of companies controlling canneries, and most of the individual canners, in British Columbia, are agreed to accept of only put up a half pack this year. This is done on account of the large quantities of salmon carried over from last year. It is expected that it will have a salutary effect upon the salmon market.

The bill of the minister of agriculture for the protection of bees, providing that during the period of spraying or sprinkling trees and shrubs with arsenical solutions, no bees shall be used in any mixture containing paris green or any other poisonous substance, was carried in the local legislation on Friday, and will come into operation until April 1st, 1891, so that the house can amend it next session should the fruit growers object.
