The Boundary Bridges Question. The disputes which have existed between the counties of Victoria and Peterborough for the sace of the Bobcaygeon bridges, resulting in litigation, have been settled by the legislative assembly. The Harvey Act passed in 1879, by which a small portion of the township of Harvey, in Peterborough, was annoxed to the township of Verulam in Victoria, and which had the effect of placing the county boundary in the middle of Pigeon Lake, as interpreted by the courts, and consequently the whole expense of maintaining the Bobcaygeon bridges was thrown upon Victoria. The amendment to the act passed by the legislature at its session just closed provides for the maintenance of the bridges in dispute, and the Pigeon Creek floating bridge, by the two counties. In the event of the counties not agreeing as to the proportion the counties not agreeing as to the proportion each shall pay, the question is to be submitted to arbitration.


