-Right Hon. George J. Goschen, chan-

cellor of the exchequer, presented the

budget in the house of commons Tuesday. Mr. Goschen said good fortune again permitted him to submit a budget showing a surplus of £1,067,000. In the last budget the estimate of expenditure was £99,264 000. The actual expenditures were £98 928,000, leaving a surplus of £336,000. This was a remarkably small difference between the estimates and actual expenditures. The total estimates of expenditures during the last three years was £264,000,000. total difference in the expenditures only £137,000. Analyzing the revenue, Mr. Goschen said that the customs produced £19,736,000, being £36,000 above the sum calculated upon. It was not alcohol that caused the increase this year, but tobacco. The revenue tax from tea was exceedingly satisfactory, yielding £34 000 over the estimates. Tobacco produced £9,953,000, being £418,000 above the previous year. All this, Mr. Goschen declared, proved that wages had not fallen and that there was still widely diffused prosperity among workingmen. The increase in the consumption of home spirits was greater in England than in Ireland or Scotland. Mr. Goschen estimated the revenue for the current financial year at £90,477,000, and the expenditure at £90, 253,000, leaving the small margin of £224. 000. Mr. Goscheu said he beld himself responsible for the prudence of estimate. The mighty river of national prosperity still remained broad and he trusted the various watersheds of national wealth would continue the stream undiminished in volume.

THE WHITBY ASSIZES. -The spring assizes opened Tuesday before Mr. Justice Rose. There were several important cases. The crown business was conducted by Mr. Hugh O'Leary, Q. C., Lindsay. The only case gone into Tuesday was an action brought on by Dr. Nation of Uxbridge to recover the amount of a bill of \$268 for medical attendance upon the family of Henry Jones, a wealthy hardware merchant of Uxbridge. It appears that defendant's wife was for years a victim of the morphia habit, and that in 1888 Jones inserted warnings in the local papers of Uxbridge forbidding all parties to trust his wife on his account. Besides this special written notices to this effect were served upon Dr. Nation and some others.
