

ANOTHER GIGANTIC FARCE. [Ottawa Free Press.]

Another action has been taken by the Dominion government in the exchequer court to recover from the members of the late firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co. about \$570,000, which is the amount they are alleged to have obtained improperly from the Dominion treasury in connection with their public contracts, through the influence of Mr. Thomas McGreevy. Possibly the minister of justice imagines that by starting sham lawsuits of this sort he can offset his impudent refusal to grant an inquiry into the charges preferred against Sir Adolphe Caron by Mr. Edgar. The suit against Messrs. Larkin, Connolly & Co. will afford work and large fees for some conservative lawyers, but the country will derive no benefit whatever from it. The defendants are entitled to plead, and that by starting sham lawsuits of this sort no doubt will plead, that the money which the minister of justice seeks to recover from them has been spent in keeping the Abbott-Thompson-Caron ministry in power -that the ministers were themselves the chief beneficiaries of the frauds by which, it is alleged, \$579,000 was impropery taken from the Dominion treasury. Mesers, Larkin, Connolly & Co. made a bargain with "the influence," by which they were to receive extra prices for dredging, changes, in plans, etc., on condition that they confributed so much money to the tory campaign fund. The bargain was carried out. It is utterly ridiculous to pretend that Mr. Thomas McGreevy and the contractors are the only persons responsible for the carrying out of such a corrupt arrangement. The changes in plans, increases in prices, etc., were reported on by Sir Hector Langevin, then
minister of public works, and ratified by
the whole Dominion capiner. An orderin-council had to be passed in each case, And now the federal ministers want Larkin, Connolly & Co. to return to the public treasury the moneys which they contributed to the tory campaign fund in 1887! Surely this is the reductio ad absum of our system of government by corrup-tion. Mr. Thomas McGreevy was utterly Connolly & Co. without the assistance of

powerless to obtain concessions for Larkin, Sir Hecter Langevin and the other ministers. The concessions to the contractors were made by the government, not by Mr. McGreevy. The latter was only the intermediary. And he is now to be "prosecuted" for obtaining campaign funds for the tory party, by the very men who owe their official existence to his corrupt bargaining with contractors. Why is not a suit commenced against Sir Adolphe Caron to recover the "toll," which that minister is alleged to have received out of the subsidies voted to the Lake St. John and Temlecouata railways? The bringing of civil actions agains: Larkin, Cornolly & Co. is exceedingly rough on Sir Hector Langevin. 
