Rural School Trustees and Municipal Council.

At Oquode hall on Monday, 11th inst. before V. C. Ferguson, a motion was made on behalf of the trustees of s. No. 18, Mariposa, for a mandamus to compel the municipal council of Mariposa to pass a by-law for the leasing of the school site to a new school site and the location of a new school house. For more than a year the question of change of site was agitated and finally an award was made establishing the old site. The statute makes such a ward binding for at least five years. The agitation continued, however, and on the presumed authority of a special meeting held since the award, the trustees applied to the township council to pass the required by-law. This the council refused to do. Hence the motion for a mandamus to compel them. On behalf of the trustees it was urged that the council were obliged to pass the by-law on its being shown that a majority vote of a special meeting of ratepayers had sanctioned the application for the loan. Counsel for the township argued that notwithstanding the imperativeness of section 115, it was the right as well as the duty of the council, in the interests of their township and of these particular ratepayers, to see that the applicants had established a clear legal right to demand what they did; that section 61 is to be read with section 115 of the act as a condition precedent, and that in the absence of proof that a majority vote had adopted the new site the council properly refused; also that the requirement asking the debentures to be made payable in ten years, was an improper interference with the discretion given to the council by the statute to extend payment over a term not exceeding thirty years, and that the court would not deprive the council of this discretion. His lordship ruled in favor of the township council on each of these points and refused the mandamus, with costs to be paid by the trustees, but with a proviso that on any application which they may choose to make on other material, Mr. D. J. Bellamy, Q.C., (McIntyre & Stewart) for the school trustees; Mr. John McSwain (McSwain & Anderson) for the township council.

Stock Notes. The Messrs. Hickey now have Valentyn J., the black son of Valentyn 233, in the "pink of condition." Mr. Robert McGahay reports his great hay stallion, Simon Pure, as being in great condition and states that he will resume his career as a great and improved horse. His stock is coming right. Mr. Richard Magill of Manvers has bought from Mr. Gillanders the dark chestnut horse, Kentucky Jr. Kentucky Jr. is well known and quite popular throughout this district.

Manufacturers or traders who succeed, by judicious advertising and through the merits of the articles they produce, in acquiring a high reputation for a class of goods bearing a particular trade mark or designation, are frequently subjected to annoyance and loss by imitators, who seek to palm off upon the public inferior articles by designating them in such a way as will confuse the minds of consumers. It is only a few days since Messrs. G. T. Fulford & Co. of Brockville obtained a perpetual injunction from the Ontario court of queen's bench restraining Messrs. S. L. Howe and W. A. Howe from selling pills in imitation of those manufactured by Messrs. Fulford & Co. under the name of "Dr. Williams' Pink Pills for Pale People," the court holding that the plaintiffs' trade mark had been infringed. Patent medicine manufacturers are perhaps more easily injured by spurious imitations of their remedies than men in other lines of business, but we see suits frequently brought by other manufacturers to maintain their rights, and the trade mark authorities in Canada and the United States are frequently obliged to reject applications for trade mark registration on the ground that the applications are merely designed to cover imitations of articles which have already acquired popularity.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, APRIL 14, 1892. Toronto Street Market. The receipts of grain on the street market today were small, being confined to four loads of goose wheat, which sold at 75c, and one load of red and white at 75c. The price of other grains were as quotations. Hay and Straw-The receipts were fair and the market was steady, 30 loads of hay selling at \$14.00 to \$15.00 for timothy, and \$11 to \$12 for clover, and three loads of straw at \$10 to \$11. Dressed Hogs-The receipts were not large and the market was steady at \$6.00 to \$6.25 (Globe of Thursday).

Toronto Live Stock Market. Receipts Tuesday at the western cattle market were light, only 19 loads, consisting of 470 hogs, 100 sheep and lambs, and the remainder cattle. Trade was slow in almost every line, and the offerings, although light for an Easter market, were quite sufficient for the demand. At noon nothing had been bought for Montreal, reports from that place being anything but bright. Last week the total receipts were 1,293 head of cattle, 475 sheep and lambs and 732 hogs. (High fees collected were \$45.00). Cattle-No better trade was experienced Tuesday than we had at the closing market day of last week. Sales were draggy, and close buying was the order of the day. Only a few extra choice cattle were found on the market, and these plucked out and sold at 45c per lb. Pretty good butcher's cattle brought 31c to 32c; fair to good heifers and steers, 30c to 31c, and inferior cattle, 27c to 30c. The local demand was light, and at noon there was quite a number of cattle unsold. Among the transactions were: 14 heifers, averaging 1,500 lbs at \$3.50 per cwt 11 mixed, " 1,110 " 4.50 per cwt 21 mixed, " 1,825 " 3.75 " 18 heifers, " 900 " 3.25 " 20 " " 975 " 3.75 per head 21 mixed, " 1,020 " 3.50 per cwt

Milk cows and springers-There was a better quality for both milchers and springers Tuesday, and better figures were paid, as the few which were offered could be classed as good ones. Sales took place at from \$85 to \$15 per head.

Stocks and bulls-Really good stockers appear to sell better than butchers' cattle and the demand for such shows no falling off. Tuesday one load of exceptionally fine cattle sold to an outside dealer for 45c per lb. They weighed in the neighborhood of 1,175 lbs. Dealers will pay from \$3.75 per cwt up to this figure for good to choice stockers.

Sheep and lambs-The quality of both sheep and lambs was poor and did not encourage brisk buying. Good grain-fed yearlings are wanted, and will sell readily at 50c to 60c per lb. Most of the offerings sold at 41c to 50c per lb. Sheep sold at 31c to 30c per lb, but the demand appears to be dull. A few spring lambs are coming in and selling at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per head.

Calves-Receipts were heavy and the feeling was considerably easier. Too many light veals have been placed on the market lately, and as they are not wanted, it tends to depress trade. Good heavy calves would find a fair demand. Cows Tuesday ranged from 32c to 37c apiece.

Hogs-Although nearly 500 were offered, the feeling was firm and all were wanted. The closing prices of last week were well maintained. Stores sold at \$4.50 to \$4.75 per cwt, and heavy 150 to 200 lb hogs at \$3.25 per cwt of cars.
