RECIPROCITY OR McKINLEY-

It is perhaps natural that the Empire as the organ of the combines and monopolies should regard with supreme satisfaction those reports from Washington which indicate that the Cleveland administration may not after all go in for thorough and energetic tariff reform. The Empire quotes with much approval a report that "the climbing down process which the democrats have apparently been doing ever since the election must be very distressing to the feeling of the free trade cranks." Whatever foundation there may be in the reported climbing down process it is clear that every down-ward step lessens the prospects of freedom of trade or a removal of trade barriers between Canada and the United States. This prospect may be very satisfactory to the Canadian McKinleyites and their organs and supporters, but it will be far from satisfactory to the Canadian farmer who has for several years suffered the loss of his best and nearest market, and who has had to put up with miserably low prices for most of what he raised while he has paid monopoly prices for most of what he has had to consume. He has for years sold low for a policy that benefits the combine: and he has for years bought high under the beneficent N. P.-that blesses the monopolist and not the farmer. were well maintained because of the great number of cattle taken for Montreal. There was a fair attend ance of outside buyers, but local purchasers held off somewhat. About 10 car-loads of stuff was sent through to Montreal and 2 car-loads for Ottawa nother feature which added an element of firmness to the market was the buying of export cattle in Montreal, between 200 and 300 head having been purchased by one shipper there to be sent over from Halifax to Great Britain. 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
