

However, the old man was flesh and blood like the rest of them. It was pointed out that he could not be placed in St. Joseph's hospital, Peterboro, as he was not an invalid. Coun. BLAIN suggested that he be committed to gaol, where he would be well

Coun. STAPLES did not think the council had the power to commit a man to gaol. Mayor Walters-"It is all very well to talk, but what were they going to do with

Dep.-reeve CRANDELL said if the council tried to commit a man to gaol they would become "laughing-stocks" for the whole community; it would be necessary to turn the old man out of the home and then the police officers would arrest him and commit him to gaol as a vagrant.
