The invoices for the material, dated in October and November were found, also a split \$1 bill that had been tampered with and the back appeared to be counterfeit. Jones had an office down town with an insurance sign on it in which he found a large printing press, some specimens of red ink printing and pieces of cardboard that corresponded with the cardboard about the packages shipped from Buffalo. 
