committee has given the public, in a communication to THE POST of the 12th inst., what he knows alout the the re-insurance of the town hall (which presumably includes the market building), due on 8th inst., and as my name has the honor of appearing so frequently therein, perhaps it might be well if I should also, with your permission, through the same medium, state publicly the circumstances so far as they occur to me at present. It is true that the insurance companies represented by me have carried the risk on

represented by me have carried the risk on the building for over thirty-two years, and I hope I l-ave, like all faithful insurance agents, endeavored legitimately to secure and retain for the companies for which I and retain for the companies for which I am acting, all the desirable business possible, and I have no hesitation in adding that I always expect to do this, as well in that I always expect to do this, as well in my own as the companies' interests. When the town property committee decided to recommend the council to decided to recommend the council to divide up the insurance among the com-pantes represented by the different agents, it appears to me that before taking any action they should have waited to see if their report embodying this change would be approved of by the council; the chair-
