

The many friends of Mr. Michael Deane. Dominion land surveyor, who exercised his pr.fession in Lindsay for nearly fifty years, will regret to learn of his death, which occurred on Saturday, 3rd Inst., at the family residence in Windsor, Oat., at the age of 77 years. Mr. Dane moved to health has been gradually failing, so that his death was not unexpected. During his residence in Lindsay he was highly esteemed for his social good qualities, and was known as a proficient in his profession. He was born at Birr, Queen's county, Ireland, and he took part in the survey of the Great Western and other English railways. He came to Canada quite a young man, and laid out the first railway to Lindsay, being that division of the Grand Trunk which runs between Lindsay and Port Hope. He also assisted in the construction of the Toronto & Nipissing and other railways, and was for many years the county surveyor of Victoria county. He was also employed both by the Dominion and provincial governments in the laying out of many townships in the north and north-west. His funeral took place on Monday, 5th inst. Rev. Jas. Scanlon officiated, assisted by Rev. John Collins, of Assumption College, Sandwich, brother-in-law. He leaves to mourn his loss two sisters, one of whom is Mother Mary Frances, superior of the St. Andrew's (Ont.) Congregation nunnery, also his wife and five children, two being sons and three daughters.

Premier Laurier Says the Canal will be Built-Favorable Consideration of the Request for the Improvement

of the Lindsay River Channel As we promised last week, we are now able to give a more extended report of the doings of the deputation to Ottawa, obtained from one in attendance.

On Monday evening about 300 delegates reached Ottawa by special train, and 200 more joined them next morning. The deputation intended to stop at the Russell house, the finest hotel in Ottaws, but the overflow was so great that many went to the Gilmour house, a fine, neat, clean new hotel; others patronized the Grand Union, the headquarters of our genial representative, George McHugh.

At 9.30 next morning a general caucus was held in the rotunds of the Russell house and adjoining rooms. Senator Cox, who came to see and help us, was made chairman, and was elevated in a commanding position on a table. Arrangements were made by which each of the claims of the delegation before the government, and all were requested to walk up in a body to the parliament buildings. A larger procession of the kind has seldom been seen in Ottawa,-there was a heavy column from the gate to the entrance of the middle wing. An enterprising photographer (Mr. Ray, of Peterboro) requested the privilege of photographing the delega-

tion en masse when they would leave the building, which privilege was graciously granted him. The largest committee room was too small to hold the members. When it was filled to overflowing, and only one-third inside, and the hon. minister of railways came in and saw the situation, he said he would try and secure better accommodation. Soon we were ushered into the large apartment occupied by the house of commons, and every seat was utilized. Senator Cox introduced the delegation to Mr. Blair, the minister of railways and canals, who was later on j inet by the premier and the postmaster general. Just here I wish to say that from the introductory speech of Senator Cox, to the end cf two hours' talk, the whole affair was very creditable. The speaking was short and pithy and argumentative, and much of displayed abilities of no mean order. heard it remarked by old timers that the talking was as good as an average psrliamentary discussion. It was evident all along that the members of the government were not only paying great atttention to what was being said, but that they were teing deeply impressed. Mr. Blair asked for a little time, that the jury might consult over the matter before they gave a decision, but from what he did say it was evident he was deeply impressed, not only by what he had heard, but also from knowledge he had gained by a personal trip over the route of the proposed waterway on a previous occasion, and that his sympathies were with the views of the delegation. The country was committed to the building of the canal, and it must be done; it was only a question of finance, and the government would proceed with the work as fast as the resources of the

country would allow. Senator Cox at one arose and offered t lend the government all the money they wanted for that purpose at 31 per cent, (Cheers). To this Mr. Laurier replied, while shaking hands with Mr. Cox, "That his offer was the most practical argument of the day."

Altogether it was a pleasant and very

animated scene to witness such a sea o upturned faces from opposite sides of the house and from both sides coming strong and united assertions from grits and tories of undivided support of the government if they would vigorously prosecute the work on the canal.
