Toronto, April 12. The business of the Legislature was finished on Saturday, and the formal prorogation will take place on Tuesday at 2 p.m. The all-important business of the final day was the discussion of the mining bill. The most significant feature of this discussion was the determined opposition of the two Government members who represent the mining districts, Messrs. Conmes and Farwell, both of whom went so far as
