MONTREAL TO BRANCH OUT.

Scheme to Make It a National Port Under the Control of the Dominion Government.

Ottawa, April 3.-A large and influential deputation, representing Kingston and Montreal shipping interests, had an interview with the Premier and other Ministers on Saturday, with reference to the opening of the canals, the building of elevators at Montreal and other matters. The deputation consisted of Mr. A. McFee, president of the Corn Exchange; Mr. D. A. Watt, secretary Marine Underwriters' Association, and Messrs. John Torrance, C. Esdaile, W. Hewgill, Joseph Ward, R. W. Redford, P. A. Crane and D. A. Campbell of Montreal, and Mayor Ryan, Capt. Gaskin and Messrs. T. Ellictt and E. J. B. Pense of Kingston. The Ministers who received the deputation were: Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies, Hon. A. G. Blair, Hon. J. I.

Tarte and Hon. R. R. Dobell. The first matter discussed was the date for opening the canals, the deputation urging that it should be earlier than May 1. On this point the Premier said that, while he could give no positive promise, he would say that, if navigation opened before May 1, there would be no difficulty, he thought, about the canals. The deputation then took up the ques tion of Montreal harbor and pointed out that the completion of the canals and the deepening of the ship channel between Montreal and Quebec would make very great and important changes in the business of Montreal, and it was strongly urged that it should be made a national port, under the control of the Dominion Government, which should build elevators, provide terminal facilities for both railways and steamboats, and generally and urged that the improvements in the harbor should be controlled by the Dominion Government for the benefit of the whole Dominion, as the lowering of charges at Montreal and the increase of terminal and shipping facilities would be in the interest of the producer, by assistmarket at the least cost. It was also urged that, in building elevators, they should be located so as to be easily accessible to the Intercolonial Railway, so that,

from Halifax or St. John. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in replying, said that he would promise that no alienation of harbor or Government land should take place without parties interested being notified, and that -all the other matters referred to sould receive the careful consideration of the Government.

RESOURCES OF MANITOBA.

A Grant to the Northern Pacific Road-Statistics Showing the Growth of the Province.

Winnipeg, April 3 .- Provincial Treas urer McMilan has concluded his budget speech in the Legislature. The estimates are very much the same as for 1898. The following changes are the principal ones: Government estimates to receive, in addition to the regular subsidy, \$300,000 from the school lands fund, about \$50,-600 from the provincial lands, an increase of \$25,000 over last year, and \$60,000 from land titles offices, an increase of about \$10,000. On the expenditure side, school grants




