The Minister of Customs Makes a Great Tariff Speech.

THE PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

Triumphant Vindication of This Popular Measure of the Liberal Trade Policy -The Iron Duties-Increased Imports From Great Britain-A Comparison That Effectually

Settles the Matter.

Ottawa, April 11.-Yesterday Hon. William Paterson, Controller of Customs. answered the attacks that have been made upon the tariff policy of the Government. He dealt particularly with the preferential tariff, which Mr. Clarke Wallace had denounced as being a deception of the English and of the Canadian people. Mr. Wallace had said that the duties had first been raised and then lowered 25 per cent. to the English exporter, so that the reduction was only apparent. Mr. Paterson pointed out that on only nine items is the present duty higher than under the old tariff, and of these the imports from Great Britain in 1896 were but \$78,000, as against a total importation of \$53,000,000. He quoted a host of figures to show that the preferential tariff had favored Great Britain,

Sir Charles Tupper, on the orders of the day being called, said that he had been informed that the speech of the Premier on the address was being sent in parcels to postmasters for distribution. He had no objection to the speech being distributed, but did not think postmasters the proper persons to make the

distribution Hon. Mr. Mulock said he agreed with the leader of the Opposition that postmasters were not the proper persons to distribute speeches of members. He further said he wan not aware of any such distribution being made.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he desired to qualify a statement made by him a few days ago in reply to a question by the leader of the Opposition (Sir Charles Tunber with reference to a paragraph in the newspapers that the United States authorities had asked for a delimitation of the boundaries between Alaska and Canada. He had said there had been no negotiations. He now desired to say that a proposition of the kind had been made by the United States authorities and an answer given by the Canadian Government, but, unfortunately, the matter was not yet in such a position that the

papers could be brought down. Sir Charles Tupper said that he would like to suggest that pending the delimitation that would take place, regulations should be made that would secure the greatest possible facilities in crossing country either way to and from the Yukon. He thought it very important that a temporary arrangement should be effected pending permanent settlement of

Col. Domville denied the correctness of a statement made in The Mail and Empire of the 7th instant in which it was said that the first charge made against Major Walsh was by the Liberal member for Kings (Domville). He had made no charge against Major Walsh, and he now wished to state that "anyone who charged Major Walsh with being drunk or drinking while in the Yukon was guilty of a base slander."

The Debate Resumed. 
