That such serious and sweeping charges could have been made in parliament by an ex-cabinet minister, who had been Minister of Justice, and therefore capable of sifting evidence, was in itself remarkable. The situation must have been intolerable, and the offences of the blackest character, that rendered it necessary for a politician of the prominence of Sir Hibbert Tupper to formulate the charges in the way he did. But if not true, Sir Hibbert Tupper was taking a base and cowardly ad-

vantage of his position in parliament to give utterance to slanders that he would not dare to make in any other public place where he could be at once brought to book. It is very strange, and not at all creditable, that as soon as his slanderous speech was finished Sir Hibbert Tupper left for British Columbia, where, owing to the absence of a law partner, he will have to remain for a month. Having made his charges he should have remained at Ottawa like a man and faced the music. But Sir Hibbert has modernized the old couplet:

"He that slanders and runs away,

Will live to slander another day." His recklessly abusive speech was in a way the sensation of the week in political circles. His attack on Major has written a formal and solemn deniwhich says:-

On the other hand, the United States had a very small increase in import trade, because we have been able to supply our own market faster than the growth of our population. We import only 5 per cent. more than we did five years ago, In imports, Japan leads again, showing an increase of 121 per cent. in the last ten years. Russia's imports have increased 51.4 per cent.; Netherlands, 34 per cent,; Great Britain, 10.3 per cent.; Germany, 10.8 per cent.; and China, 18 per cent. The imports of France have fallen off 1.8 per cent.; those of British India, 11.1 per cent.; and those of British Australasia, 7.9 per cent."

We quote them at length because the figures are in themselves interesting. There is lacking, however, a very important detail, which is that within the last decade Canada's exports increased from \$89,000,000 to \$164,000,000 or at the rate of about 85 per cent., surpassing both Japan and the United States. Lord's Day Alliance Formed in Town Rev. J. G. Shearer, of Hamilton, was greeted with a large audience in St. Andrew's church Thursday, on the occasion of his visit to Lindsay as the representative of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance. Rev. L. S. Hughson occupied the chair and aptly introduced Rev. Mr. Shearer, who spoke forcibly on the "Imperilled Sabbath." Mr. Shearer referred in opening to the importance to the country of the proper observance of the Sabbath, and then discussed at length the perils threatening us in Ontario. These arose from two main causes,-the greed of gold and lust of pleasure. These causes were co-operating in making at-

tacks on the Lord's Day. The Lord's Day Alliance was not an organization of bigots to force men to go to church and Sunday school, but an alliance of men and women determined to preserve the Sabbath as a day of rest and worship for everybody. Their great aim was to preserve the liberty of the individual on the Sabbath against the encroachments of corporations bent on depriving him of his right to a restday. Two million men in the United States were now absolutely deprived of a rest-day in the week. To guard against this in Canada the Alliance

was formed. In addition to the perils from the greed of gold and the lust of pleasure, the law was sadly defective and the Alliance was seeking to have the law perfected. Mr. Shearer gave instances of the violation of the Sabbath day, and of successful attempts to fight these

At the conclusion of the address branch of the Lord's Day Alliance was organized. Sheriff McLennan was secretary, and Mr. James Low, treasurer, and these, with the ministers of the town, were appointed to perfect the organization.
