## COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Business and Produce. The county is suffering a great deal for want of rain. The spring opened in a very promising way, but the absence of rain and the frequent frosts and cold spells have combined to render vegetation very backward. A light shower or unless there is a copious downpour in another week the outlook will be very discoursging.... Wool in Toronto is opening at 18c to 1910. Pure Down, 22c to 24c. Wool in Lindsay is 18c to 20c.

Toronto Live Stock Market. Last week's receipts at the western cattle market were 4,429 cattle, 240 sheep and lambs and 1,225 hogs. Tuesday the offerings were 32 ject, and the desirability in the public loads, including about sheep and lambs, 350 hogs, and 150 calves. The market was active and prices all round were firmer, but not quot-

> Cattle-The quality of the stock on sale Tuesday was very good, and somewhat above the bulls, 1,500 lbs, 41c per b. For butchers' cattle prices were firm and ranged from 41 to 50 per b, with a few extra choice head going up to to 51c

Calves-The quality of the calves offered to day was very good and prices were a little high-er, ranging from \$6 to \$8 each for good, and \$1 to \$6 for inferior. The demand was good and sufficient to absorb all offerings. Some sales were: 79 calves, 135 lbs. \$6 50 each; 36 do, 160 lbs. \$7.25 each; 10 do, 140 lbs, \$6.75 each; 5 do, 110 lbs.

Sheep and lambs—The offerings to-day were small and all were wanted. Prices were a little higher, ranging from \$6 to \$7 each for good wool sheep and \$5.50 to \$6.50 for clipped. A few spring lambs were offered, and they were all taken at

from \$4 to \$5 each.

Hogs—The receipts to-day were not very large and all seemed to be wanted, with, perhaps, the exception of stores. Prices were from 20 to 25c per cwt higher than on Friday, and the market was fairly brisk. Fat hegs sold at \$5 25 to \$5.30 per cwt, and light fat and stores at \$4.25 to \$4.50 per cwt. A few mixed lots of hogs were sold at Springers—Backward springers for the export trade were in demand, but they were scarce. Sales were made at from \$30 to \$45 per head.


