Stock Notes. Mr. Burt McGill of Yvelton is now the happy possessor of a large and handsome trotting colt some ten days old. This youngster is bred in the "purple," being sired by his popular Hambletonian sire, Murex Wilkes, and out of the handsome road mare, Lady Bell, by the noted horse Belmont Star. This colt, in color and markings, possesses resemblance to his sire, and, judging from his blood-ines, we predict that he will have any amount of "luck" in him when he reaches maturity. Mr. McGill has also a number of colts his farm by Murex Wilkes, out of dams owned by leading breeders throughout the district, and travelled last season, and that are again being returned to him. They are of good size and are being bred by breeders in each of speed.

It was direct attention of stockmen to the fact, in another column headed "A Standard Refuted," it appears that a rumor has been circulated to the effect that the stallion, Just the Thing, was never equal to the emergency, and at once set about to effectually silence in such malicious rumors. His dam was Victoria (1779), a prize-winning mare by What Care I (181), one of the best sires of the breed. He is a very big colt, full of outline, having very heavy clean bone, and will probably be a candidate for very high honors. Mr. Day's venture in a half interest in a long figure will doubtless be duly appreciated throughout North Victoria, as anywhere the horse is large, sound, active stock.
