ANOTHER GERRYMANDEE.
A Bill to Increase the Tory Majority—Equalities Disturbed and Inequalities Left Alone—More "Dividing the Grits." This is a time for plain speaking by all independent and faithful exponents of public opinion. The government, with promises of fair dealing still vibrating on the lips of the two leaders, are repeating the usual party tactics. The worst features of the gerrymander of 1882 are reproduced in the Redistribution Bill, introduced in parliament on Friday by Sir John Thompson. The object is to convert a minority of Tories in the country into a majority of Tories in the house. Let the reader examine the following facts and see if he is not forced to the same conclusion.

THE QUEBEC CHANGES.
The liberal leaders from Ontario almost forgot to think about the little commonwealth in the Niagara peninsula in their indignation over the shameful carrying of the Montreal district. Almost every clause of the bill respecting Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba will be challenged, and if the government persist in the measures as introduced and their followers support them as the honor of the party and the safety of the government is at stake, the government has already expressed revolt. In the recent caucus Colonel O'Brien said, "We are most anxious to do what is fair towards our opponents in this redistribution." Colonel O'Brien owes his first election to the gerrymander of 1882, but he has learned since then and now apparently sees the injustice of it.

ECHOES FROM THE CAPITAL.
The Caron Charges—A Threatened Tory Bet.
The results of the recent bye-elections in Welland and Toronto have convinced the respectable members of parliament supporting the government that they cannot afford to uphold the action of the ministers in refusing an inquiry into the charges preferred by Mr. Edgar against Sir Adolphe Caron and it is announced that the government is prepared to accept an investigation. It is understood, says the Ottawa Free Press, that Mr. Caron has secured a considerable following in his efforts to resign. The ministers will hardly venture to resist his demand. They will swallow themselves and all they have said. The quibblers who take their cue from the minister of justice still insist that the charges are "not definite enough," but when asked to explain their meaning say Mr. Edgar should not have named the 22 constituencies which were debauched with the money obtained improperly by Sir Adolphe. This it turns out that what the Tories really find fault with is that the charge is too definite. Mr. Edgar has been too explicit. He has furnished too many details. Had he failed to name the counties which Sir Adolphe debauched he would have been told that his allegations were not specific enough.

REPRESENTATION BY POPULATION.
The well established principle of representation by population is ignored in a bill which purports to be based upon that fixed principle. Sir John Thompson said that the unit of population in Quebec is 22,300, in Ontario, 23,000. The electoral divisions to be disturbed were, upon this principle, those which fall short of or exceed this unit of 23,000. Here is the population of some of the electoral divisions which were disturbed and some which were not touched:

THE NIAGARA PENINSULA.
The electoral division of Lincoln, Niagara and Welland are, by this present bill, united and then divided in such a manner as to make Lincoln a liberal hive and Welland a safe conservative county. The electoral division of Monk was gerrymandered in 1882, but having gone reform last general election it can no longer be relied on and is therefore partitioned between Lincoln and Haldimand. Monk contains two townships, Gainsborough and Pelham, which last general election gave a liberal majority of 568. This immense liberal majority is put into Lincoln where it is not at all needed by Mr. Gibson, the liberal member who has over 300 majority without it. The four remaining townships of Monk are added to Haldimand and one township of old Haldimand, Walpole, is added to South Ontario, thus giving to Col. Tisdale, who badly needs it, a township with a conservative majority. Haldimand is left a safe conservative county but its compact shape is destroyed and old associations snapped.
North Wentworth, represented by that stalwart progressive farmer, Mr. Bain, is wiped out. The township of Beverley, with a conservative majority, is dumped into North Brant to join the present liberal majority of over 1,100 in that riding and the remainder of North Wentworth with a conservative majority of 150 is added to South Wentworth to increase the majority of one vote, secured by Mr. Carpenter, conservative, at the last election.
North Wentworth with its 14,500 population is wiped out, and South Grenville, with only 12,331, is not touched. The reason is that North Wentworth invariably returns an opponent of the government and South Grenville a supporter.
EQUALIZATION.
To show the pretense of equalizing population, Welland, which had over 2,000 excess in the unit, is made to have nearly 4,000 in excess, and notwithstanding that Lincoln had within 1,200 of the unit, that riding is given by this bill 2,300 in excess of the unit, and South Wentworth 2,700 in

THE LATEST REVELATIONS.
On Saturday the Globe published another batch of receipts given by Sir Adolphe Caron to Thomas McGreevy for money spent in Quebec county in 1887. The receipts in possession of the Globe show that Sir Adolphe superintended the expenditure of \$10,000 in Quebec county in 1887, though the return of his legal expenses only accounts for \$902. What becomes of the balance? The making of a false return of election expenses is a criminal offence. A conservative member from the maritime provinces, speaking of the matter today, said he had told the ministers plainly that he would not sacrifice his honor by voting against Mr. Edgar's motion. "And," said he, "a great many feel as I do." If Mr. Edgar would only modify his resolution by leaving out the names of the 22 counties, he would make a split in the government party which would be serious indeed. I admit that there is nothing in the cry about "vagueness" but an amendment of the motion would deprive the ministers of their only excuse for refusing an inquiry. But

the charges will have to be investigated. No explanation will satisfy the country unless that is done.
The Globe's revelations make it clear that the Abbott-Caron ministry owes its existence to Thomas McGreevy, the man whom they now pretend to be anxious to send to the penitentiary for "conspiracy" to raise money with which to purchase constituencies for them.
