THE LAST GERRYMANDER.

Sir John Thompson has introduced his long expected gerrymander, or redistribution bill, ostensibly based on the last census, but really intended to secure a conservative majority in the house for a conservative minority in the country. is a bill intended to perpetuate a tory administration though the people may have placed on record a popular condemnation that by the old constituencies would have turned the tory party out of office. Nothing but the first gerrymander saved Sir John Macdonald from defeat; and t gave material assistance in the elections The present gerrymander, while not as

extensive as the first one, contains features just as unfair and objectionable. Additions have been made to several "grit hives" so as to strengthen the tory neighboring constituencies. An outline of the bill is elsewhere printed. North Brant, which stretched from Dundas to Woodstock, and contained slices from three or four counties, has had a portion of North Wentworth added to it; and North Wentworth is wiped out, thereby depriving Mr. Bain of his constituency. The new South Wentworth is a remarkable specimen of gerrymandering. All the changes have been made with the same object in view-not to remedy inequalities or remove inconveniences, but to strengthen the tory party and to "hive the grits." There ought to be a public spirit that would condemn such unfair and unmanly tactics, but such public spirit apparently does not exist within the tory ranks. Toronto Live Stock Market. Receipts at the western cattle market were heavy Tuesday, there being 61 loads of sale stock to change hands when the market opened. These included \$50 hogs, 60 sheep and lambs and the remainder cattle and calves. Outside of the heavy export business which was done in cattle, trade was dull and unsatisfactory. There dealers, and a large amount of business was transacted, but, considering the quality of the bulk of the cattle offered, prices were low, and and 335 sheep and lambs. Weigh fees, \$50 66. Cattle-Buying cattle for export was in full swing Tuesday, and on this account a demoral ized market was thus prevented. Mr. John Rogers, representing Bickerdike & Crowe, ex-Rogers, representing Bickerdike & Crowe, exporters, Montreal, was the principal buyer, while Mr. Aikens of Port Hope was not far behind in his purchases. Mr. Rogers paid \$5.15 per cwt. for some fine export cattle, which was the top figure. Most of the cattle for export which sold, hawever, brought from 4½ to 50 per the About 26 loads in all were taken east. Butchers cattle were unchanged in price, although under a heavy run the feeling was easy. Tuey sold at from 3½ to 4c, with extra picked lots bringing 4½c. Under this head a number of loads of what are called "short keep" cattle brought 4½ to 4½c. These were cattle almost good enough for export. Inferior and medium cattle were unchanged and rather dull. Among the transactions reported were:

sheep and lambs—The feeling was easy for sheep and there was apparently a poor demand. One bunch of 7, averaging about 175 lbs, sold at \$7 a head. Yearlings sold at about 6c per h and spring lambs at \$3,50 to 4.50 per. head.

Calves—Offerings were liberal, but very little change was experienced from the trading of last week. Most of the offerings, which consisted of light to medium yeals, sold at from \$5 low's majority accordingly. Mr. Macdonald should not be discouraged.
