OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, May 12, 1892, Toronto Live Stock Market.

Receipts at the western cattle market were large again Tuesday, consisting of \$18 cattle, 65 sheep and lambs, 625 hogs and 100 calves. The market, on the whole, was a fairly satisfactory one. The attend an ce of buyers, both local and outside, was large, and in most lines the prices of Friday were well maintained. The hog market alone showed any tendency to weakness. and this is on account of excessive offerings of the past week or two. Last week the total recelpts were:-1,829 cattle, 1,497 hogs and 270 sheep and lambs. Weigh fees, \$60 29. Cattle-The larger part of the offerings Tues-

day were export cattle. Mr. John Rogers was on the market again buying for Bickerdike & Crowe, Montreal. He picked up altogether about 300 head at prices ranging from 42 to 520 per b. Some very fine cattle were offered, and for these the outside figure was paid readily. Most sales, however, were effected at 42 to 50. "Short keep" cattle, of which there was a large number on the market, sold at 41 to 41c. About seven loads of export cattle were bought by Mr. Thomas Eakins of Port Hope. In butchers cattle there was also a good trade done, and the yards were well cleared up before the close. The prices of the closing day of last week were well maintained, and the healthy tone which marked trade then was not absent Tuesday. Choice butchers' cattle sold at from 32 to 40, extra choice picked lots do at 4½ to 4½c. Common to good stock sold at 3 to 3½ per 1b, with good demand. The quality of the bulk of the offerings Tuesday was good and tended to give a steady feeling to the market. Among the transactions

feeling to the management of the line of t cows and springers-Only a few were

Milch cows and springers—Only a few were offered and trade in consequence was light. Considerable enquiry was heard for fresh calved milchers and good forward springers. Prices generally ranged frem \$31 to \$i5per head. Two fair animals sold at the inside figure.

Stockers—Very few animals which could be classed as stockers offered and the demand was apparently dull. One or two small lots sold at 3½ to 40 per h. One bunch of 10 fine cattle, too good for stockers, sold to an outside buyer at 4½c per h. They averaged in weight about 1,250 lbs, and for this class of cattle were hard to beat.

Sheep and lambs—Although offerings were light they were quite sufficient for the dull demand which prevailed. A few bunches of good grain-fed yearlings changed hands at 5½ to 6½c per h. but outside of the trade done in these business was generally quiet. Only a light supply of spring lambs came in. There was some enquiry at \$3 to \$5 apiece.

Calves—Trade was quiet and the feeling under liberal offerings easy. Most of the sales were effected at from \$3 to \$6 apiece. Too many light veals are coming in and this tends to depress trade.

Hogs—The run was heavy in spite of the fact that last Friday's market was in a demoralized state, and that the prospects for Teusday would be anything but favorable for good prices. It is evident that supplies lately have been greatly in excess of the demand, and the low prices at which even good etock sold Tuesday will continue as long as the present glut exists. Last week we had nearly 1 500 hogs here and the week before close on 2 009, and even though a large number were sent east and some to differlarge number were sent east and some to differ-

Some Interesting Judicial Decisions. McNabb vs. Parkins.-This was an action against A. W. Parkins & Sons to prevent them. from booming their saw logs in front of the plaintiff's property, just above their shingle mill. The case was tried at the last assizes and created considerable interest, judgment being reserved at the time. Judgment was given on Monday last by Mr. Justice Rose dismissing plaintiff's action with costs. Barron & Mo-Laughlin for plaintiff, G. H. Hopkins for defen-

Re Hudspeth Estate-Henry Mullet's claim.
-This was the first claim upon which proceed-This was the first claim upon which proceedings were taken to administer the Hudspeth estate. Mr. Mullet left with Mr. Hudspeth over \$6,000 for investment, and after his death Mr. Adamson, inspector of the Toronto General Trust Co, the executors, handed over certain securities and obtained a release from Mr. Mullett, fixing his claim at \$3,433. Shortly after Mr. Mullet consulted Mr. Hopkins and was advised that the accounts had been improperly taken and that he was not obliged to accept the securities at their face value but only for what they were worth, and therefore Mr. Mullet, alleging he had been imposed upon, demanded that the release be given up and the accounts taken properly. The company refused accounts taken properly. The company refused to give up the release and contended that there was nothing more due to him, and after wasting nearly three months and the company still refusing to do anything Mr. Mullett took action, and therefore the company themselves took action and asked to have the estate administered by the court, which has been going on for the past two years before Judge Dean, who has now decided as to Mr. Mullet's claim, holding that the release got by Mr. ent cheese factories in the country to fatten, still local dealers cannot handle the large number remaining here.
