AGRICULTURAL DEPRESSION.

Laziness Attributed as the Cause by a College President.

The eternal and inexorable law that the only price of good things is labor has its application to the subject of agricultural depression, says President Jordan, of Leland Stanford, Jr., University, in an article in the Forum. Though the enemy has sown tares in the tax laws while the farmer has slept, this alone cannot cause agricultural depression, nor can inordinate pensions, wasteful subsidies, and the tyranny of capital, combined, if the farmer himself were not, in some degree, at fault. At any rate, the remedy is in his own hands, and, while striking a blow at the cause of the injury, he should look at himself, to see what part of the blame is due to his own weakness and lack of foresight. The "relentless hell" of poverty which,

Henry George says, yawns beneath civil society, is due to the presence of a horde of men who would gain something for nothing; the natural penalty for laziness is one of the important elements in our so-called agricultural depression. A notion having been spread among country people that the dwellers in towns do not have to work hard for a living has caused the farmer to think he ought to take his rest, and the interest on the time thus borrowed is becoming a heavy "While crossing Indiana, on a bright, growing day in April," says President Jordan, "I counted forty men and boys around the railroad station at Cloverdale, where a crate of live chickens was the sole contribution to the train's load. These were farm boys, who ought to have been at work in the fields, and village boys who might have been doing something somewhere. These idlers on the station steps were embodied ghosts, dead to all life and hope, with only force enough to standaround and gape. At my destination I saw sixty men and boys, who had no need of cures of any kind, because they were already dead, standing on a street corner, listening to the noisy vender of a rheumatism cure. Most of these were farmers, whose neglected farms lay bathed in the sunshine, the earth ready to rejoice only at the touch of a hoe. 

WHAT THE HACKNEY HORSE IS? celebrated English Hackney horse from Wm, Taplin's

Sporting Dictionary and Rural Repository of General

Information, pu blished in 1803, which says:-"Hackney, in the general acceptation of the word' with the sporting world, is a horse 'superior to all others' on the 'score of utility, being rendered subservient to every office of exertion, speed or perseverance, or in other words to all the drudgery and labor of his situation, from which his contemporaries, the racer and the charger, by the imaginary superiority of their qualifications and pampered appearance, are always exempt. It is the peculiar province of the Hackney to carry his master twelve or fifteen miles in an hour to covert, where the hunter is in waiting, and some-times to bring the groom back with even greaterexpe dition. It is the department of the Hackney to cellent and his spirit invincible. He must be able to go twenty five or thirty miles at a time without drawthe roads or the state of the weather, and if he is not equal to any weight in these trying exertions, he will be held in no estimation as a Hackney of fashion." Many instances are given of the performances of these horses, which prove them to be possessed of most wonderful powers of endurance and speed. On March 5th, 1823. Maberly's mare trotted over a four mile course in Epping Forest, "sixteen miles" in fifty-eight minutes and ten seconds, carrying ten stone (one hundred and forty pounds). At Terryheath, on the 20th of November of the same year, Captain Mansfield's brown mais trotted nine miles in thirty-one minutes. In 1832, on the 27th of April, Mr. Dixon, of Knightsbridge, trotted his mare Nonpareil in a match cart, one hundred miles in nine hours and fifty six minutes and fifty-seven seconds. The first fifty six minutes and fifty-seven seconds. The first twenty miles were trotted in two minutes less than fatigue and on entering the stable began eating hay as if nothing usual had occurred. About the same time a broken kneed stone blind mare of Mr. Woodcock's, East Harling. Norfolk, trotted forty miles on the London Road is ithree hours and forty-nine minutes. Jenny Lind, a mare famous for her speed, in about 1841 trotteds mile within three minutes, carrying fourteen stone (one hundred and ninety-six pounds). In taking this mare to Nottingham to be served by Lord Spencer's Champion, a distance of eighty miles, her owner rode her out of the yard on a fine Sunday afternoon, arriving at Doncaster the same night; took Monday for Nottingham, and back to Doncaster and home on Tuesday before dark, being a journey of more than one hundred and sixty miles, and the mare showed not the slightest sign of distress.


