Of late years, Chinese newspapers on the European model have been started, and are well supported in the matter of advertisements. So now, the loser of bank-notes or other portable property can, and very frequently does, announce his loss in good the recovery of his property and the detection of the thief. 

in the bottom board. A nail will secure the door shut. Excavate a couple of inches of dirt in the open space, E, for one or more steel traps. Before fixing the trap in place put a couple of live chickens in it and shut them in. I caught a weasel the first night and a skunk the second. A Home-Made Wheelbarrow. It is an easy job to put up a good wheelbarrow and it costs only a trifle. Buy a wheel if you have none and put together a frame like this one, using tough scantling 2in square and bolting it together with three-eighths inch bolts. A neat body with movable side boards may be made, or a



strong box flaring over both handles and wheel may take its place-one that will hold 5 to 8 bu. The end board at the handles should slide in and out and the arrangement will be found most handy. Legs made like these slide along on the ground and do not break easily.



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
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
