
FARM AND GARDEN.

DESERVATIONS WORTHY OF CON-SIDERATION IN RURAL AFFAIRS.

A Poultry House That Consists of a Two Story Upright and Two Wings Built by an Enthusiastic Poultryman of New York State.

The accompanying cut represents a southeastern view of the main building of Mr. Willis Clark's poultry yards, Wyandotte, N. Y. This building furnishes the winter quarters, which consist of a two story upright and two wings-total length, 80 feet; upright, 16 by 20 feet; wings, each 12 by 32 feet; on stone foundation, boarded with rough boards first, then covered with tarred paper, and again with inch pine siding (matched), the whole being tastily painted, and costing about \$600. The building stands on a tableland facing square

The building is divided into ten pens, each 8 by 91 feet, separated by wire netting attached to baseboards 2 feet high. The feed is kept in the front portion of the upright, and is fed on the floor of the alley (22 by 80 feet), water being also set in the alley, thus preventing its overturn or waste of food by trampling. The fowls feed through spaces between &-inch fron rods, set 3 inches apart, about 18 inches high, above which wire netting completes the division between the pens and alley to the roof.



POULTRY HOUSE WITH WINGS. Mr. Clark claims no originality in the construction of the nests or other furniture, except that to circumvent "egg eaters" he sometimes closes his nests and compels the culprits to lay in nail kegs, at about one-third of the distance from the bottom of which he builds the neets. This has proven effectual when all other means have failed. All furniture is portable, and can be carried through the door leading to the alley, taken out doors and cleansed by scalding, whitewashing or painting with crude petroleum, which he obtains from 'oil wells only six miles away at a nomhundred so-called cures, and never experiinal price. AUTOMATIC TELEPHONES.

It is as much an open question now as it ever was in the days of the immortal Shakespeare whether it is not better to "bear the ills we have" than "fly to others that we know not of." It is perhaps ungallant to speak of the long-suffering and usually patient "hello girl" as a cross to be borne with Christian resignation, but the stern and solemn fact remains, that if you ring your bell too much in her ear the "linked sweetness long drawn out" that is supposed to characterize the angelic switchmaiden of your lightning expressions is liable to be changed to something undeniably peppery.

A device more or less complicated, intended to do away with the "central" operator, is now being brought before the public. ladies of a chance to earn their daily bread is totally beyond our comprehension. Our comprehension may be limited, but while the fact remains that the annual interest on the cost of a six or eight wire system, such as the new-langled idea requires. would be more than enough to pay the wages of expert operators, we are compelled to cry cui bono, what is the good? Why displace the operators, whose wages are a small fraction of the expense of a telephone system, in order to introduce other compilcations and expenses.

Any system that depends on a battery current to work its mechanism at a distance must, in the nature of things, be uncertain.
