LOCAL MATTERS.

LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL.

REGULAR MEETING—COMMUNICATIONS AND REPORTS—THE STREET AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE'S APPROPRIATIONS—A VOTE OF CENSURE AGAINST REV. ROBT. JOHNSTON.

A regular meeting of the town fathers was held Monday evening in the council chamber. The member present were Mayor Walters, Reeve Killeb, Dep-reves Crandell and Johnston, and Couns. Blain, Keith, Gillogly, O'Halloran, Touchburn, Staples, Robinson and Killaly.

The minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read by the clerk and on motion were confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS.
A number of small accounts—J. Berry, \$11.30; S. Hughes, \$7; S. Dobson, \$5; Consumers' Gas Co., \$15.50; J. Walsh, \$5—were read and referred to the finance committee.

From G. H. Hopkins, town solicitor, with reference to the town's power to assess telephone, telegraph and electric light poles and wires.—Referred to the finance committee.

From E. S. Wilson, M. D., making application for a number of tiles for boulevard paving purposes.—Granted.

From G. H. Hopkins, C. Harrington and Jas. Gibbons, asking for sufficient 8-inch tile to drain from Cambridge to Lindsay-st.—Referred to street and bridge committee, with power to act.

From E. L. Somerville, town engineer, with reference to alterations in the market building. The amount expended was \$85.10, which was less than the estimate. The painting of the ceiling, and other work necessary, would bring the cost of the work up to about \$700. It was estimated by Coun. Blain that the engineer had proposed a hardwood flooring, but this in winter time it would prove very slippery.—Coun. Killeb advised that a floor of 2-inch plank, tongued and grooved, be put down, and the suggestion met with approval.

From E. S. Knight and others, asking that a 2-ft. sidewalk be laid on the west side of Francis street, from Victoria-ave to Albert-st.—Referred to the street and bridge committee.

From W. Vetch, secretary of the fire brigade, reporting one fire alarm in April. The captain of the brigade asked that the council purchase a few of Essex extension ladders.—Referred to the fire and water committee.

From the chief of police, reporting \$50.35 imposed in fines during April, and \$46.30 collected. Billiard and other licenses collected swelled the total amount paid into the treasury to \$330.35. Referred to police committee.

From J. E. Flood, complaining of ball-playing on York-st. adjoining the Ontario Bank, and asking compensation for broken windows.—Referred to police committee.

REPORT OF THE STREETS AND BRIDGES COMMITTEE.

Coun. TOUCHBURN, chairman, presented a full report of the work recommended by the committee after a thorough inspection of the town last week. The estimate and merely proposed for work, creating and some little ditching, nevertheless the amount is large. Here are the amounts that it is proposed to spend in the different wards:—
