Section of Iowa Suffers Great Destruction.;

50 PEOPLE KILLEB AND INJURED.

Bailroads Leading Into Dubuque Washed Out-Galena, Ill., Under Water-Michigan Also Visited by the Storm Flend - People Killed and Houses Wrecked.

Des Moines, Iowa, May 25.-Nine persons were killed and several injured in a cyclone which struck near this city at midnight. The storm struck Valeria, a small town 19 miles east of here. It blew the Maple Leaf Depot into splinters, killing four persons. Five other people, living near the depot, were also killed. Oswalt, a mining town, two miles south of Valeria, and much larger than the latter town, is

Des Moines, Ia., May 25.-The most alarming reports are being received here this morning respecting the cy-clone which swept over Polk, Storey and Jasper Counties shortly after midnight last night. Owing to the almost total prostration of telegraph and telephone wires, it is not possible to verthat the casualties will reach 50 killed or injured.

Fourteen persons are reported killed in the three towns of Val-ria, Bondurnt and Ankeny. The two latter towns as in this (Polk) county, while Valeria is in Jasper County, directly east. So far as heard from, Slater is the only own in Storey County which suffered, but as there is no means of communication with that section this morning there is every probability that the restoration of telegraphic communication will bring news of disasters as yet un-

A telephone message from Berwick says that a courier just in states that 24 persons were killed at Bondurant, five at Valeria and three at Ankeny. Later .- The situation grows worse as authentic news comes from the cyclone district. At Valeria it is now known that 15 persons were killed, the number being first placed at but five. Most of those killed were in the depot of the Chicago Great Western road, some of them having just alighted from the train, and others having taken refuge from the rain. The depot was literally blown to pieces. The west-bound passenger train escaped the cyclone but a few minutes.

A despatch from Santiago, this county, says the storm was unprecedented in its fury in that section. Three miles west of town a house was lifted bodily from the earth, carried some distance and thrown to the ground a shattered wreck. The entire family of occupants was killed. The roads are almost impassable from debris.

A messenger from Bondurant, wh arrived at 9 o'clock, says that R. G. Scott, a prominent farmer, was killed; also that a church at Ankeny was blown down and several persons injured. The town of Granger was badly wrecked. The number of farm houses wrecked between Valeria and Bondurant is very heavy.

GREAT STORM AT CHICAGO.

Houses Blown Down Everywhere Press

Rooms Had to be Pumped Out, Chicago, May 25 .- A storm of wind, thunder and lightning struck Chicago at 2 o'clock this morning. The wind at times attained the velocity of a hurricane, and the lightning was incessant Over an inch of water fell in less than ten minutes, which amounted to a cloud burst. The sewers were unable to carry off the water, and as a result basements all over the city were flooded. The press rooms of three morning papers were flooded by water backing up from the sewers, and fire engines had to be called to pump out the water before the second editions could be sent to press. Much minor damage from wind and lightning is reported all over the city, but no fatalities resulted. The storm extended scuth of Chicago into Will and Kankakee Counties. There is every probability that wrecks will be heard of on the eastern shore of the lake. The work of the storm in the suburb-

Streets-A Woman Drowned. Galena Ill., May 25.—A flood devast-ed Galena last night, as the result of a cloudburst. Danger signals called people from their beds and the night was spent in efforts to save themselves and property. Water rushing in torrents from the bluffs to the low ground, with the sudden rise of the Galena River, turned the down-town streets into running rivers. Tow boats did service on Main and Commerce-streets, Franklin-street is a scene of devastation. The solid macadamizing of the street hasbeen gutted out to the depth of ten feet laces. Several bridges are washed by. Cellars on Main-street are inum ed and places of business in some parts of the town are aban-Walls of solld masonry were torn out, buildings carried from their foundations and horses swept from floating barns, down the deluged Several houses were wrecked, among them that of J. F. Strick-

land, whose wife was drowned. SWEPT DOWN TO DEATH.

Mrs. Clark's Four Children Drowned When the Durango Station Went,

Dubuque, Ia., May 25.-A terrific thunder and lightning storm struck Dubuque shortly after 9 o'clock last night. In the midst of the storm Mrs. Clark, station agent of the Chicago & Great Western Railway at Durango, eight miles northwest of Dubugue called from her residence to the depot nearby to get orders for a train which had just arrived. She took hir four children with her and was at work when the flood sweeping down the Maquoka Valley carried away the bridge, then the residence and finally the depot, which was borne down stream a mile and a hair. The four children were drowned, Lut Mire. Clark clung to the roof and was saved by the train-

All rallroads leading into Dubuque Bridges on all the roads were washed out, the Illinois Central losing 30 be-

ed the depot and streams which forked at the bridge poured their floods into the valley until it was filled from bluff to bluff, a distance of 150 yards. The depot went out about 2 o'clock and after sains 50 yards struck a tree and sane a few days ago,

careened. Tom Griffith, a brakeman, seized the oldest Clark child and jumped. Both are missing. Two section ruen, James Dillon and Peter Moss, caught the limbs of an overhanging tree and will be rescued when the flood subsides. The depot lodged against a tree and this morning the body of one of the Clark twins was found some yards below the lodging place. Those who remained in the depot were rescued soon after it lodged. The loss of her children drove Mrs. Clark crazy.

Twelve persons were killed by a flood on the Bloody Run, a stream along the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, empty-ing into the Mississippi at North Mc-Gregor. One man was drowned at Dy ersville, Dubuque County, and two were killed at Manchester.

A Dozen Killed in Michigan. Pontiac, Mich., May 25.-Reports from Ortonville, Oakwood, Oxford and Thomas, which are located in Oakland County, 15 to 20 miles north of here, say that a cyclone swept these sections this afternoon. Ortonville and Thomas were nearly wiped out of existence. It is said that fully a dozen people lost their lives at Ortonville, while at Thomas four were killed.

Six Killed at Mount Clemens. Mt. Clemens, Mich., May 25,-A cy clone passed over this city this even-ing, wrecking about 50 houses and kill-ing six or eight persons and injuring several others.

GREAT FIRE AT DESERONTO.

The Rathbun Company Suffer-Their Immense Flour Mill, Grain Elevator and Several Employes' Houses Burned.

Belleville, Ont., May 26.-(3 a.m.)-I is reported that a big fire is raging in Deseronto to-night, but no particulars can be obtained, as all the wires are interrupted. A large portion of the Rathbun Co.'s property, including the flour mill, grain

employes' residences, are said to have been destroyed. The Roman Catholic Church was also burned. The loss cannot be estimated to-night, but it will probably amount to fully a quarter of a million. Insurance not

Deseronto, May 26.-Yesterday afterncon about 3.20 fire broke out in the tie dock of the Rathbun Company, east of the cedar mill, and in a short time spread to the docks adjoining, destroy ing large quantities of shingks, posts, hardwood, etc., the flour mill, house, elevator and the Canoe boat-house. Going northward and eastward, it swept away almost the entire eastern portion of the town. The Roman Catholic Church and several stores were consumed. The spread so rapidly that many persons lost all their possessions, some being

away from home. A large quantity of cord wood belonging to the Rathbun Company was destroyed. A strong southerly wind was blowing at the time and drove the flames northward. A steam fire engine was brought from Napanee and also one from Kingston. About 9 o'clock a terrific downpour of rain, accompanied by thunder and lightning, passed over the town, lasting about three hours, and that helped to extinguish the flames and smoldering ruins. THE CZAR'S CORONATION.

Priceless Jewels and Gorgeous Regalia Which Will be Worn by the Czar and Czarina.

Moscow, May 25.-At 3.15 p.m. to-day the gorgeous regalia which will be used at the ceremony to-morrow were transferred with great pomp from the treasury to the throne room, the hall of St. Andrew, in the Kemlin Palace. The most important of these is the magnificant crown which was manufactured by a Geneva jeweler at the command of the Empress Catharine II., immediately after her accession to the It somewhat resembles mitre, surmounted by a cross of five flawless diamonds, and the celebrated pear-shaped ruby, which has scarcely a superior in the world. This forms the only touch of color, the rest of the stones being diamonds and parls, The setting is of silver, and there is a band of purple velvet inside. The value of the crown is over 1,100,000 roubles, but that of the sceptre surpasses it. Made for the coronation of the Emperor Par in 1797, it is the most wonderful thing of its kind which has ever been known for the famous Orloff diamond surmounts it. The orb also dates from the reign of Tsar Paul and is of solid gold set with three rows of brilliants and a huge almond-shaped diamond The diamond cross is supported by an exquisite sapphire, worth a fortune. The Czar will also don the collar, star and jewel of the order of St. Andrew, valued at over 1,000,000 roubles. This order is never worn save on a day of coronation, and is adorned with five pink diamonds, and two Siberian aquamaines, one blue and the other green, set in diamonds. The jewels which the Czarina will

wear are a little inferior in value. The state coronet contains stones of unequaled beauty. The necklet worn with it consists of huge single stones with hanging pendants of still larger

The coronation robe is the most costly ever beheld, and the masses of preclous stones which Her Imperial Majesty will wear in addition, will be of incredible value. They include the smaller insignia of the St. Andrew Order, set with gems representing a for-

These magnificant symbols of au thority will remain in the throne room during the night guarded by a detachment of the Grenadiers of the palace, and several gentlemen of the court. This afternoon the Emperor and Empress left the Palace of Alexandrina and took up their quarters in the Kremlin. Their chief devotions were paid today in the Cathedral of the Redeemer, a small chapel upon the Gold Court, surmounted by twelve small gilted cupo-

This prive e chapel of the palace contains aracle-working image of the Saviour, and here before the golden Ikonostas, the Imperial couple perform their acts of preparation for the morrow's sacred ceremony. All day long preparations have gone

forward for the morrow and many of the tribunes which were erected for the triumphal entry have been removed that more space can be given for the massing of soldiers and the entrance and grouping of invited guests. The decorations throughout the city have been looked to, and removed where necessary.
