AWFUL CYCLONE A Section of Iowa Suffers Great Destruction. 50 PEOPLE KILLED AND INJURED. Railroads Leading into Dubuque Washed Out - Galena, Ill., Under Water - Michigan Also Visited by the Storm Wind - People Killed and Houses Wrecked. Des Moines, Iowa, May 25. - Nine persons were killed and several injured in a cyclone which struck near this city at midnight. The storm struck Waterloo, a small town 10 miles east of here. It blew the Maple Leaf Depot into splinters, killing four persons. Five other people, living near the depot, were also killed. Owalet, a mining town, two miles south of Valeria, and much larger than the latter town, is supposed to have suffered even worse. Des Moines, Ia., May 25. - The most alarming reports are being received here this morning respecting the cyclone which swept over Polk, Story and Jasper Counties shortly after midnight last night. Owing to the almost total destruction of telegraph and telephone wires, it is not possible to verify the reports, but indications are that the casualties will reach 50 killed or injured. Fourteen persons are reported killed in the three towns of Valeria, Bondurant and Ankeny. The two latter towns are in this (Polk) county, while Valeria is in Jasper County, directly east. So far as heard from, Slater is the only town in Story County which suffered, but as there is no means of communication with this section this morning, the probability that the restoration of telegraphic communication will bring news of disasters as yet unreported.

A telephone message from Berwick says that a courier just in states that 24 persons were killed at Bondurant, near Valeria, and three at Ankeny. Later - The situation grows worse as authentic news comes from the cyclone district. At Valeria it is now known that 15 persons were killed, the number being first placed at but five. Most of those killed were in the west end of the Chicago Great Western road, some of them having just alighted from the train, and others having taken refuge from the rain. The west-bound passenger train escaped the cyclone but a few minutes. A despatch from Santiago, this county, says the storm was unprecedented in its fury in this section. Three houses in west of town a house was lifted bodily from the earth, carried some distance and thrown to the ground a shattering wreck. The entire family of occupants was killed. The roads are almost impassable from debris. A messenger from Bondurant, who arrived at 3 o'clock, says that R. G. Scott, a prominent farmer, was killed; also that a church at Ankeny was blown down and several persons injured. The town of Granger was badly wrecked. The number of farm houses wrecked between Valeria and Bondurant is very heavy.

GREAT STORM AT CHICAGO. Houses Blown Down Everywhere - Trees Uprooted - Lightning Struck Chicago at 2 o'clock this morning. The wind at 3 o'clock attained the velocity of a hurricane, and the lightning was incessant. Over an inch of water fell in less than ten minutes, which amounted to a cloud burst. The sewers were unable to carry off the water, and as a result basements all over the city were flooded. The press rooms of three morning papers were flooded by water backed up from the sewers, and fire engines had to be called to pump out the water before the buildings were damaged. The storm extended over the city, but no fatalities resulted. The storm extended into Cook County, where it did considerable damage. Several persons were injured. At Ravenswood, McDonald's circus was tented when the cyclone came and ripped the canvas from the stakes, snapped the guy ropes and upset the animal cages. Irving Park and Ravenswood came in for the greatest damage. Several persons were injured. At Summitville, one house was blown down, resulting in serious injuries to the occupants. So far as reported the injured are: Miss Reitenstahl, slightly bruised; Peter Albert Sweetzer, arm broken and internally hurt; Mrs. James Danaher, seriously bruised; Albert Danish, seriously bruised and bruised.

GALENA, ILL., INUNDATED. Tow Boats Doing Service in the Business Streets - A Woman Drowned. Galena, Ill., May 25. - A flood devastated Galena last night, as the result of a cloudburst. Danger signals called people from their beds and the night was spent in efforts to save themselves and property. Water rushing in torrents from the bluffs to the low ground, with the sudden rise of the Galena River, turned the down-town streets into rushing rivers. Tow boats did service on Main and Commerce streets. Franklin street is a scene of devastation. The solid masonry of the street was so soft as to sink to the depth of ten feet in many places. Several bridges are washed away. Galleries and places of business in some parts of the town are abandoned. Walls of solid masonry were done down, buildings carried from their foundations, and horses swept from floating barns, down the deluged streets. Several houses were carried away, among them that of J. F. Strickland, whose wife was drowned.

SHEPT DOWN TO DEATH. Mrs. Clark's Four Children Drowned When the Darango Station Went. Dubuque, Ia., May 25. - A terrific thunder and lightning storm struck Dubuque shortly after 9 o'clock last night. In the midst of the storm Mrs. Clark, station agent of the Chicago & Great Western Railway at Durango, eight miles northwest of Dubuque, called from her residence to the depot nearby to get orders for a train which had just arrived. She took her four children with her and was at work when the flood sweeping down the Mississippi Valley carried away the bridge, then the residence and finally the depot, which was borne down stream a mile and a half. The four children were drowned, but Mrs. Clark clung to the roof and was saved by the train. All railroads leading into Dubuque were washed out and telegraphic communication completely destroyed. Bridges on all the roads were washed out, the Illinois Central losing 30 between Dubuque and the depot which was the storm began with her children - two girls, 8 and 4 years old, and two girls, 2 and 4 years old. The law, Albert E. Palmer, was recently arrested at Reading for the murder of a number of infants, some of whose bodies were recovered from the river, and formally indicted for murder in the criminal court, Old Bailey, to-day. Mrs. Dyer was judicially declared insane a few days ago.

CONTAINED. Tom Griffith, a brakeman, seized the oldest Clark child and jumped. Both are missing. Griffith, a section man, James Dillon and Peter Moss, caught the limbs of an overhanging tree and will be rescued. The depot, lodged against a tree and this morning the body of one of the Clark twins was found some yards from the depot. Those who remained in the depot were rescued soon after it lodged. The loss of her children drove Mrs. Clark crazy. Twelve persons were killed by a flood on the Bloody Run, a stream along the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul line, in the Mississippi at North McGregor. One man was drowned at Dyer'sville, Dubuque County, and two were killed at Manchester.

A Dozen Killed in Michigan. Pontiac, Mich., May 25. - Reports from Onondaga, Oakland and Macomb Counties, 15 to 20 miles north of here, say that a cyclone swept these sections this afternoon. Ortonville and Thomas were nearly wiped out of existence. It is said that full grown apple trees were blown over at Ortonville, while at Thomas four were killed. GREAT FIRE AT DESERONTO. The Rathbun Company Suffer - Their Immense Flour Mill, Grain Elevator and Several Employees' Houses Destroyed. Belleville, Ont., May 25. - (3 a.m.) - It is reported that a big fire is raging in Deseronto to-night, but no particulars can be obtained, as all the wires are interrupted. A large portion of the Rathbun Co.'s property, including the flour mill, grain elevator, barn stables and several employees' residences, are said to have been destroyed. The Roman Catholic Church was also carried away. The loss cannot be estimated to-night, but it will probably amount to fully a quarter of a million. Insurance not known.

Later - Loss \$350,000. Deseronto, May 25. - Yesterday afternoon about 2:30 fire broke out in the dock of the Rathbun Company, east side of the cedar mill, and in a short time spread to the docks adjoining, posts, large quantities of shingles, posts, hardwood, etc. The flour mill, grain house, elevator and the Canal Club boat-house, were also destroyed. It swept away almost the entire eastern portion of the town. The Roman Catholic Church and several stores were consumed. The flames spread so rapidly that many persons fled from the mill, some being taken away from their possessions, some being taken away from their homes. A strong wind blowing from the south-southwest, the flames northward. A steam fire engine was brought from Napawan and also one from Kemptville. About 9 o'clock a terrific wind-pour of lightning, passed over the town, lasting about three hours, and which smothered the flames and smoldering ruins. About 75 families are homeless, many of whom owned their houses. The loss will no doubt figure up over \$350,000.

THE CAZAR'S CORONATION. Priceless Jewels and Gorgeous Regalia Which Will be Worn by the Czar and Czarina. Moscow, May 25. - At 3:15 p.m. to-day the gorgeous regalia which will be used at the coronation to-morrow were transferred with great pomp from the treasury to the throne room, the hall of St. Andrew, in the Kremlin Palace. The most important of these is the magnificent crown which was manufactured by a Geneva jeweler, and is the property of the Emperor Nicholas II. It is a masterpiece of art, and is set with a cross of five flawless diamonds, and the celebrated pear-shaped ruby, which has scarcely a superior in the world. This forms the only touch of color, the rest of the stones being diamonds and pearls. The setting is of silver, and there is a band of purple velvet inside. The weight of the crown is over 1,000 grammes. It is made of the scepter of the Emperor Paul, and is the most wonderful thing of its kind which has ever been known. For the famous Orloff diamond surmounts it. The orb also dates from the reign of Paul, and is set with diamonds and a huge almond-shaped diamond. The diamond cross is surmounted by the crown of the Czar, and is set with five pink diamonds, and two Sibirian adamantine, one blue and the other green, set in diamonds. The jewels which the Czarina will wear are a little lighter in value than the Czar's. The necklace worn at the coronation consists of huge single stones, and is set with diamonds. London, May 21. - In the House of Commons to-day Mr. George Curzon, Under Foreign Secretary, laid in reply to a question by Mr. Henry Seton-Karr, Conservative, that the relations controlling the fur seal fishery in British Columbia were in accordance with the recommendations of the recent Fisheries Commission, but steps were now being taken to improve the administration of the regulations. Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, announced that the Colonies had received a telegram from President Kruger of the Transvaal Republic, stating that the jail reform bill was very much improved, so as to increase the comfort of the Reform Committee prisoners.

Excitement at Pretoria. Over the Heavy Sentences Imposed Upon the Johannesburg Reformers. London, May 21. - The Times will to-morrow print a long despatch from Pretoria detailing the excitement arising from the heavy sentences imposed upon the members of the Reform Committee. The despatch says that the verdict of the court is not only a surprise, but is also a disappointment. The foreign residents of the Transvaal are dismayed. "The news is so unexpected that Great Britain will not meddle with their affairs or with the sentences of the prisoners." Rural Artists Arrive Dead. London, May 21. - Edward Armitage, historical and mural painter and member of the Royal Academy, died at Tunbridge Wells yesterday.
